MARRIAGE A FAILURE

Every One in the House Works But Father.

WOMAN WITH 12 CHILDREN

Seeks Divorce Because Her Husband Is Troubled With Constitutional Weariness and She Has to Support Family.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 19,-"Marriage is a failure. I have never gone to a wedding of one of my children, and I never want to."

This was the statement of Viola F. Woods, mother of 12 children, on the witness-stand in Judge Galloway's court last Friday, where she is suing for a divorce from Joseph L. Woods, after 39 years of wedded life.

It was a case where everybody worked but father, according to Mrs. Woods' story to the court. She asserted that it was principally by her hard work in managing their farms, picking hops, etc., that the 12 children were raised and educated, and that her husband did nothing at all. One of the children corroborated this statement.

The Woods were married in Iowa in 1867, and their troubles began when they came to Oregon in 1891. For the last 10 years they have lived together scarcely at all, each residing with different children. They have avoided each other to such an extent that when one of the girls was going to be married, Mrs. Woods refused to stay for the ceremony when she heard her husband was to be present. It was in the explanation of this episode that she made her startling dictum regarding married life.

SEAPORT METROPOLIS.

Los Angeles Annexes Large Territory to City Limits.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 19 .- The spe dal city and county election of last Monday has made Los Angeles a seaport city.
