PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—Another drop of 10 cents was announced today in the price of sugar by the Western Refinery Company. The poultry market is unsettled, very few offerings being made. Prominent orchardists are seeking to bring their apples into competition with the Hood River apples, but there continues to be a large difference in the prices asked.
