Steamer Aurelia Safely Berthed at Elmore Dock.

COLUMBIA, HUMANTIA OUT

Steamers Johan Poulsen and Alliance Arrive In—German Ship Marie Hackfeld Comes In From Honolulu—Notes.

Yesterday morning the steamer Aurelia, which was beached on Desdemona Sands on Tuesday last, after having shifted her cargo dangerously, was towed up to the city and berthed at the Elmore dock, where she will discharge her huge load of lumber; she will then be pumped out, duly inspected, her cargo restored, and she will go on her way as usual. There is said to be nothing serious the matter with her, but the way she looks lying at her berth, makes a landsman think all sorts of things, a habit land-lubbers have. Captain Johnson is commended for his sagacity in bringing his ship back to port, and doing it so successfully. She will be here for a week at least.

The steamship Columbia came down from the metropolis early yesterday morning with over two hundred people in her saloon, her intermediate cabins and her steerage. She took on the following people at this port: In the saloon, D. Welbourn, A. Pellard, Henry Ostrum, Charles Mathews, T. Durnen, H. G. Hanford; Intermediate cabins, Alex McDonald; steerage, L. La Caviglia, H. A. Edwards and E. K. Fredhelm. Alec Moir, a well known young Salemite, was among the saloon passengers, bound for Southern California. She got away at 9:45 from her dock here and crossed out at high noon.

The German liner Numantia arrived down from Portland early yesterday morning, on her way to China, and went below at 9:30 o'clock. She attempted to cross out, but put back for some cause, probably to await the flood, not then made at full. She went to sea afterward.

The schooner A. F. Coats will finish loading at the Clatsop mill dock this morning and go on to Stella for a complete cargo. She will take on ties enough there to round out her half-million feet capacity; then she will sail for the Bay City.

The steamer Alliance arrived in from Coos Bay at 10 o'clock yesterday morning and after delivering fifty-five tons of freight at this port, went on to Portland with her thirty-one passengers.

The German ship Marie Hackfeld, Captain Grubbe, which sailed from Honolulu on November 5, arrived in over the bar yesterday afternoon, after a favorable and uneventful trip up from the Islands.

The Star of Bengal, from Stella with

1,373,000 feet of lumber, in the shape of 36,795 railroad ties, bound for San Diego, cleared from this port yesterday, and will probably sail today. She is lying off Tongue Point.

The Norwegian steamship Terje Viken, arrived down from Portland about dark last night and went to an anchorage in the city channel. She is laden with lumber and bound for Port Pirie.

A wealthy young citizen of Bremerhaven, Germany, by name William Ottens, is a passenger on the German ship Marie Hackfeld, which arrived from Honolulu yesterday. He is making a world-tour at leisure, and enjoying it immensely. This is his initial visit to America.

The steamer Johan Poulsen was among the arrivals from the California metropolis yesterday. She is in command of Captain Merriam, formerly of the F. A. Kilburn.

The lively little Telegraph left Portland with thirty people on board yesterday morning, and docked here at 1:30 p. m. yesterday with sixteen.

The French ship Bouffon, Captain Le Dru, grain laden for the United Kingdom, went to sea yesterday morning.

The oil tank steamer Argyle made a get-away from the lower harbor yesterday morning, San Francisco bound.
