Major Murphy Surprised and Killed Eleven Pulajanes. MANILA, Dec. 1.—A force of con- stabulary under command of Major Murphy surprised the camp of Pa- blo, chief of the Pulajanes, on the Island of Samar, at daylight yester- day, November 30. Eleven of the Pulajanes were killed and the chief's son and nine of the band were wounded. Chief Pablo himself escaped, but his wife and daughter were captured. Clothing, arms and papers found were destroyed together with the camp. The capture of Chief Pablo is con- sidered only the question of a few days. There is now only one other chief at iarge and plans have been arranged to capture or kill htm.
