Swept Out of Existence in a Terrible Flood.

MANY LIVES ARE LOST

Concentrator Dam Gives Away Precipitating Great Flood on the City.

ALL BUILDINGS DESTROYED

Saloon Washed Away, Carrying Sev eral Men Into the Torrent and All Are Believed to Have Been Drowned.

BISBEE, Ariz., Dec. 4 .- One of the worst floods in the history of Clifton came down the San Francisco river Creek last night. The creek runs through the principal business section of the town which was almost completely ruined. From seven to twenty persons are reported to have lost their lives. One woman was caught in a falling buildinf and killed. A saloon which was washed away, carried several men into the torrent and they are all believed to have been drowned. A woman and a child in a restaurant were killed, the restaurant being entirely demolished and washed away. A large number of small frame buildings in which Chief Dinan to Be Removed from people were known to be living were also destroyed, and it is known that a number of families perished.

minary injunction to be the ordinary and proper judicial disposition of such maes; and there have undoubtedly been flagrant wrongs committed by judges in connection with labor disputes even within the last few years, altho I think much less often than in former years. Such judges by their unwise action immensely strengthen the hands of those who are striving entirely to do away with the power of injunction; and therefore such careless use of the injunctive process tends to threaten its very existence, for if the American people ever become convinced that this process is habitually abused, whether in matters affecting labor or in matters affecting corporations, it will be well-nigh impossible to prevent its abolition.

In connection with the delays of the law, I call your attention and the attention of the Nation to the prevalence of crime among us and above all to the epidemic of lynching and mob violence that springs up, now in one part of our country, now in another. Each section, North, South, East, or West, has its own faults; no section can with wisdom spend its time jeering at the faults of another section; it should be busy trying to mend its own shortcomings. To deal with the crime of corruption it is necessary to have an awakened public conscience, and to supplement this by whatever legislation will add speed and certainty in the execution of the law. When we deal with lynching even more is necessary. A great many white men are lynched. but the crime is peculiarly frequent in respect to black men. The greatest existing cause of lynching is the perpetration, especially by black men, of the hideous crime of rape-the most crimes, even worse than murder. Mobi frequently avenge the commission of this crime by themselves torturing to death the man committing it; thus

MURDER

C. Gillette Found Guilty of Murder By Jury.

SENTENCED THURSDAY

Murdered His Sweetheart Grace Brown at Big Moose Lake July II.

mmediately After the Jury Had Been Polled He Wrote a Telegram to His Father Announcing the Verdict.

HERKIMER, Dec. 4.-The jury in the trial of Chester Gillette, accused verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. Sentence will be pronounced on young Gillette next Thursday morning, to which time the court adjourned after the jury had report-

Young Gillette sat motionless in his chair as the jury was polled and when the twelfth man had responded, the stolld indifference of the boy was exhibited as never before. Leaning over a nearby table, he drew toward him a bit of white paper and taking a pencil from his pocket, wrote this message:

"Father, I am convicted. Chester." This is one of the earliest dispatches carrying the news of Gillette's doom beyond the walls of the court house. It went to his father in Denver.

After the jury had been polled, the case went over until Thursday when Gillette will be sentenced. The jury stood eleven for conviction and one for acquittal until the sixth ballot. The attorneys for Gillette will make a motion for a new trial, preliminary to taking an appeal to the supreme court, for alleged erros of law occurring during the trial. This will not interfere with the sentence which will be imposed by the court.
