**British Steamship Apollo Arrives from Guaymas, Mexico.**

**FORMOSA IN FROM GUYAQUIL**

**Aurelia Getting in Good Shape Again—Light-Ship No. 76 Ready to Sail for San Francisco—Amaranth Arrives—Eider Returns.**

The steamship Geo. W. Eider came in from San Francisco and Eureka yesterday, with a small passenger list and some freight. Her officers report that she behaved exceedingly well on her trial trip, and as soon as she "gets warmed up" will be a cracker-jack for service in all ways. She left up for Portland after taking on a huge lot of shooks at the Callender pier.

The steamer Aurelia has been divested of the surplus water she had in her hold, and is now at the Elmore pier awaiting inspection at the hands of Inspectors of Hulls and Boilers Fuller and Edwards, who, it is said, will be down today. She will then take on her load of lumber and proceed to her destination, San Francisco.

Light-ship No. 76, recently overhauled at the government buoy dock at Tongue Point, has been shifted to the Sanborn coal dock where she is taking on her supplies, preparatory to leaving out for San Francisco, where she goes on special duty, relieving the light-ship No. 76, off the Farallones.

The British bark Formosa, 53 days out from Guayquil, Chile, Captain Pretwest on the bridge, came into port yesterday, consigned to Balfour, Guthrie & Company, at Portland, for grain for European delivery.

The steamship Columbia arrived in from San Francisco yesterday morning, and after a brief stop at the O. R. & N. pier, went on to the metropol.

The British steamship Apollo has crossed in from Guaymas, in ballast, for Portland, and went on to her destination at once.

The barkentine Amaranth, twenty-five days from San Pedro, came in over the bar at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and will load lumber outward at Portland.

The steamer Johan Poulsen came down from Portland yesterday, San

Francisco bound, and proceeded directly to sea.

The barkentine Wrestler, in ballast, from San Francisco, has arrived in and will load lumber for the Bay City at Portland.

The new steam schooner Casco came in yesterday from San Francisco and proceeded directly to Portland, for a load of lumber.

The steamer Tiverton is in again from the Bay City and loading at the Tongue Point mills for the return trip south.

The steamer Northland was among the arrivals from the California coast yesterday, Portland bound, for lumber.

**HAVE BEEN RESCUED.**

**Two Hunters Thought to Have Been Lost are Found.**

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—News came to Chicago yesterday concerning the fate of J. S. Lincoln and D. R. Caldwell, lost while moose hunting above Lake Superior, not far from Grand Marais. They are alive and have been rescued. Mr. Lincoln is vice-president of the Abbott Machine Company, this city. Mr. Caldwell is a traveling salesman for the same company.

When it was learned that they were lost and thought to be dead F. H. Smith, treasurer of the company, went to Duluth and from there started a search. He telegraphed from Port Arthur, Ont., yesterday, that the missing men had been found in good health but weak.

**NEW YORK LIFE.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—It was said at the district attorney's office yesterday that the affairs of the New York Life Insurance Company would be investigated as soon as the case of George Burnham, Jr., counsel for the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, was finished. Assistant District Attorney Kreisel will conduct the case which may be passed upon by the present grand jury. Andrew Hamilton, it was stated, will be one of the witnesses.

**He Will Appeal**—Yesterday morning Justice Goodman imposed a fine of \$25 upon E. B. Hill, charged with assault and battery upon Albert Rosh, but he gave notice of appeal and will probably prosecute it.

**Made a Start**—Abraam Pieti, a native of Sweden, yesterday took initial steps toward perfecting his citizenship as an American, and will go up before Judge McBride in February next, to qualify.

**For City Purposes**—The citizens of New Astoria have made a formal tax for city purposes at 3 mills upon a valuation of \$51,513, and have so informed County Clerk Clinton.

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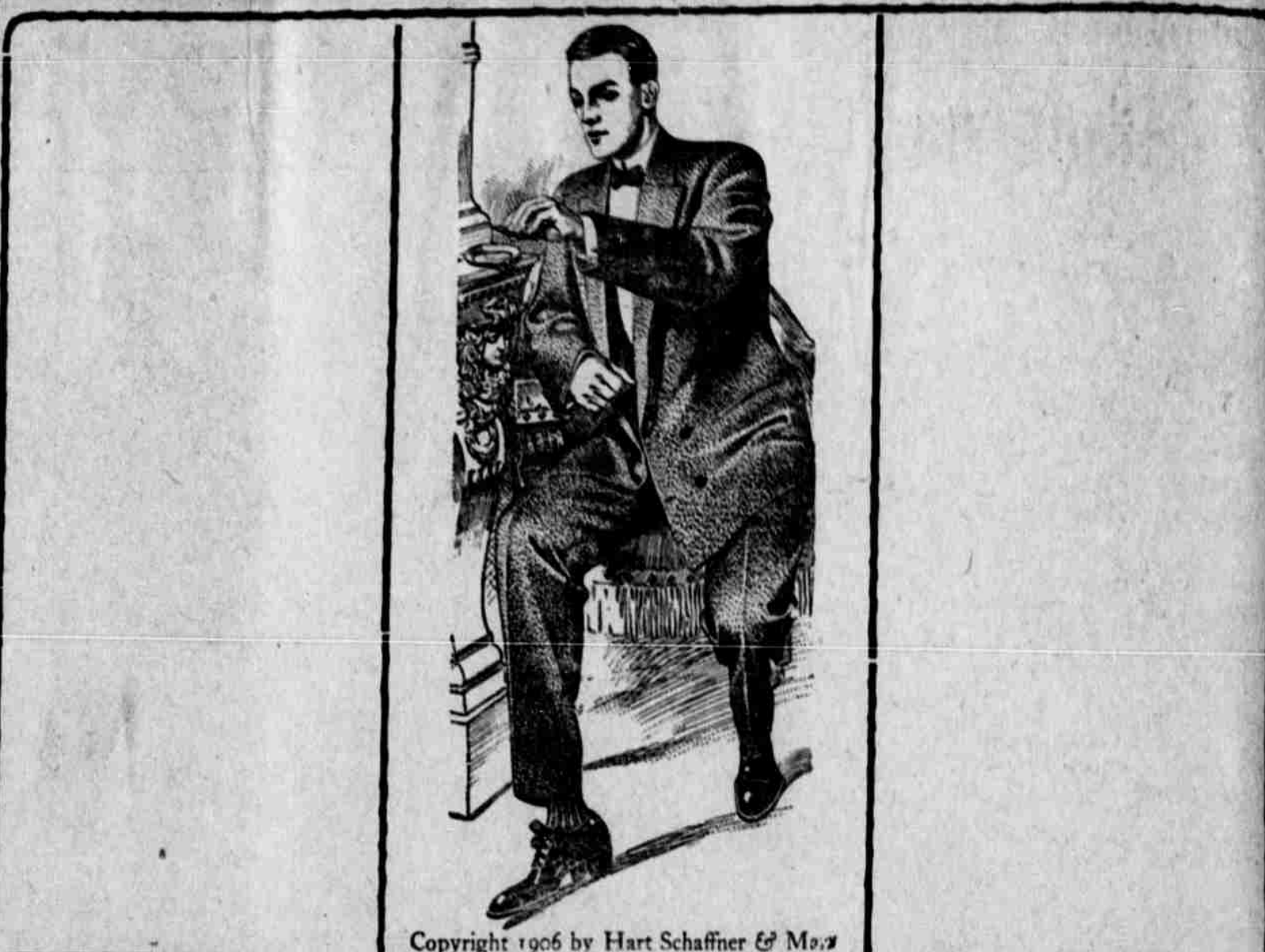
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**THE COMMISSIONERS OF CLATSOP**

**COUNTY AFFAIRS HANDLED YESTERDAY—ROAD MATTERS DISPOSED OF—CURRENT CLAIMS REVIEWED AND ORDERED PAID.**

The regular December session of the Clatsop county commissioners court was convened here at 10 o'clock yesterday morning with County Judge Trenchard and Commissioner William Larson on the bench, and County Clerk Clinton and Roadmaster Frye in attendance.

The forenoon was devoted to a review of the claims against the county, for which warrants were ordered to issue in due course.

The clerk was directed to draw a warrant in the sum of \$12, on account of county poor, in favor of Margaret Johnson.

The Young's River Telephone company presented a petition for the privilege to carry its wires across the county bridge over the Walluski, and the same was granted and the bridge tender directed to expedite the matter.

In the matter of planking a certain portion of the county road in road district No. 11, the court being apprised that the Westport mills would furnish the necessary and proper lumber at \$10 per thousand, the supervisor was directed to proceed with the work.

A communication from J. Boyle and others in relation to the Walluski bridge was read and action deferred until the January term.

Roadmaster John Frye submitted his report for the month of November and the same was approved and ordered filed.

An order was made confirming the plat of Kruse's Second Addition to Gearhart Park and ordering the same to be public records.

An application was made by L. B. for the adjustment of a certain tax matter in relation to lots 10 and 11 of block 2, subdivision of tract 3, Chelsea, and the court took due cognizance of the same, pending the acquirement of certain necessary information.

A petition in relation to the condition of road district No. 17, was received and the roadmaster was directed to examine into the matter and make due report.

A petition was also received from Jonas and Martha Noemi, in relation to road matters, and the same

was referred to Roadmaster Frye for detailed examination and report. The court then adjourned.

**SEASIDE ELECTION.**

**Official Vote of the Town Election Held Last Monday.**

The following is the official vote of the town election held at Seaside last Monday:

Mayor, A. E. Miller, 92; W. E. Lewis, 77; recorder and police judge, W. E. Burke, 121; M. M. Moore, 47; treasurer, W. S. Henninger, 152; councilman at large, R. R. Cole, 105; Geo. Mendian, 64; councilman second ward, E. J. Boyle, 39; H. C. Anderson, 35; councilman for two years, J. A. McIntyre, 58; councilman first ward, Howard Loughton, 84. Following is the vote on the amendments: 1. Requiring officials to be tax-payers in Seaside, yes, 109; no, 12; No. 2. Fixing official term at two years, yes, 84; no, 47; No. 3. Changing time of election from one to two years, yes, 67; no, 63; No. 4. Providing for notices of election, yes, 95; no, 23; No. 5. Providing for residential qualifications of electors, yes, 98; no, 19; No. 6. Providing for canvassing elections, yes, 91; no, 18; No. 7. Specifying the time in which officials shall qualify, yes, 101; no, 13; No. 8. Defining when offices are vacant and manner of filling vacancies, yes, 93; no, 8; No. 9. Providing for time for council meeting, yes, 98; no, 16; No. 10. Fixing duties of mayor and election of president of the council, yes, 95; no, 16; No. 11. Giving council power to levy a tax not exceeding ten mills, yes, 62; no, 64; No. 12. Giving council power over barrooms and gambling, yes, 87; no, 48.

The contest was between the citizens or Anti-Saloon League, and the Independent Citizens, or open town, the latter carrying the election by a substantial majority.
