WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 .- If Chairman "Jim" Tawney of the House committee on appropriations has his way, the big supply bills will not lag this winter. With his lieutenants, he supplying the demand and causing a is already at work on the legislative judicial and executive bill, which carries the salaries of the greater proportion of government employees from the President down to the charwoman in the departments.

The District of Columbia appropriation bill, the fortifications and pension bills will come next in order. "We want to get all four of these bills reported to the House before the holidays," said Chairman Tawney. "We expect to pass the legislative bill be-fore we adjourn for the holidays, and possibly one other of the annual budgets."

"Whatever new legislation there may be, if any," continued Mr. Tawney. "will depend in a large measure upon the reccommendations the President may make in his message. There probably will be considerable discussion regarding the proposed new plan for the construction of the Panama Canal."

Among other things Chairman Tawney said he knew of no new line of policy suggested with regard to the appropriations of their limitations, which will be cheerful news to the government clerks, who possibly

as at any previous one. The appropriation bills will no doubt take the greater part of the soution. There will be little time for anything else."

If, they say, it were possible to make a few reductions at a special session to be called after the Fifty-ninth Congress ends, and to do nothing more, they favor the calling of such a session.
