

JOINS THE PROCESSION.

Former United States Senator Favors Initiative and Referendum.

Hon. Wilkinson Call, who for eighteen years was a member of the United States senate from Florida, has issued an address to the citizens of his state directing their attention to the development of machine rule and "its oppressive use so as to create the vast accumulation of all the fruits of labor in the hands of the few" and that "there is a widespread public opinion that representative government trembles in the scales between violent revolution, with all its wild and cruel and misguided excesses, as in France in the French revolution, and some remedy for its successful, practical and conservative reform."

The remedy, declares Senator Call, "which the great body of public opinion believes in is the re-establishment of a system whereby the voters may ballot direct on public questions—the initiative and referendum—to be used along with representative government." The venerable statesman adds: "Citizens who favor reform in government and the initiative and referendum as a means of restoring sovereignty over the powers of government to the people qualified under a capable electorate are invited to send their name and address to me and join in appointing committees to organize movements to carry these measures into practical effect by requiring candidates for office to pledge themselves to their support."

"Missouri, Colorado, California, North Dakota, Massachusetts and Illinois by a majority vote have recommended these measures. Nine congressmen from Missouri and Illinois, with their four United States senators, have been pledged to their support. All the labor organizations in the United States are earnest in the advocacy for a reform in representative government. Resolutions have been introduced in the legislature of Florida, but failed to pass. If the people of Florida desire to take part with the great army of citizens arrayed to restore sovereignty to the people it should be made known to their fellow citizens, who are enthusiastically engaged in this work."

LABOR MUCK RAKERS.

Beware of the Slenderer Who Villifies His Fellow Unionists.

Appropos of the "muck rake" writers in the political field, it is well known that the labor movement has a large number of "muck rakers" who are always circulating malicious falsehoods about those in charge of union affairs, and there is no doubt that George W. Perkins, president of the Cigarmakers' International union, had these in mind when he wrote the following:

"The foul tinge of slander often does more damage to the labor movement than the opposition of employers and even nonunion men. The unprincipled puppet who willfully or maliciously lies about a fellow workman is worse than a 'scab.' The fellow who goes about slandering and lying about officers or members is in nine cases out of ten a 'scab' at heart and far worse than the meanest kind of a thug, who only robs one of his money or other valuables. Honest, true union men only have their character, and this they are entitled to until it is shown by facts that they are not worthy. The sneaking character assassin who will rob another of his character has no decency and is the meanest kind of a criminal and should be shunned by all decent men. One of the surest ways to destroy a union, discourage the non-unionist from joining the union and giving the union a bad standing with the public is to lie, vilify and slander the officers and active members thereof. Things who do this should be rounded up and expelled, and the sooner they are the better it will be for all concerned."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Common Council of the City of Astoria has declared its determination and intention to improve Columbia Avenue from the West end of Bond Street to a point 102 feet South of the South line of Taylor Avenue to the width of 30 feet upon the line that said street is now improved and on the established grade thereof. From the center line of the West end of Bond street to a point 160 feet Southerly therefrom; the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking and hand rail and replacing the same with new decking and hand railing. The decking to be 4 by 12 inches, 30 feet long, and from said point 160 feet Southerly from the West end of Bond street for a distance of 60 feet Southerly, the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking, stringers caps and posts and planking and under-pinning the street to the width of 30 feet, and from said point 220 feet South of the center line of Bond street to said point 102 feet South of the South line of Taylor Avenue, the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking, caps and stringers and grading the street to the established grade, and planking the same with planks 4 by 12 inches to the width of 30 feet.
