MACHINERY EXPORTS.

Large Amount of Harvest Machinery Shipped to Russia.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Record breaking exports of agricultural machinery, it is said, are about to be made to Russia by the International Harvester Company. Nine chartered steamships will be dispatched to the Black and Bal the sea ports. British, Swedish and Norwegian vessels will be employed. The first vessel is scheduled to sail next week. In addition to these complete shiploads, cargoes will be forwarded by regular line boats which will bring up the total shipments to North and South Russia to close to 100,000 tons this season. This will mean the loading of nearly 3,000 cars of material, representing a value of fully \$5,000,000. Six entire cargoes of reapers, mowers, harvesters, rakes, etc., will be forwarded to Odessa and Novorossisk on the Black sea.

INCREASING FACILITIES.

Atchinson, Topeka and Santa Fe will Increase Equipments.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—The tribune today says:

The Atchinson, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway is making preparations for large expenditures in 1907 for extensive improvements all along its system. Its budget for the year has not been finally made up yet, but its outlays for double tracking, extension, new equipment, etc., probably will aggregate not less than \$25,000,000. One of the most important pieces of work the road now has under way, the double tracking of its main line from Chicago to Kansas City, will be pushed rapidly, although it is doubtful if it will be completed before some time in 1908. Another large improvement is the construction of a new line from Mexico, New Mexico, to Brownsville, Tex. It is said that when this line is built Santa Fe will have the shortest route between San Francisco and Galveston.

The Santa Fe has placed orders for equipment which raises its outstanding orders to \$9,000,000. It is also proposed to reduce much of the roadbed, and to extend the block signal service.

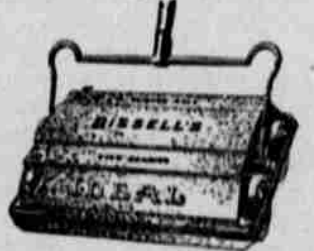
