the late Dolph Sanders, arrived in this city yesterday, from Portland, and was immediately in touch with the kind of the mortuary ceremonies prothem that the family had changed its purpose of sending the body to the old home at McMinnville, and that it would be taken to Portland and there cremated. Mr. Sanders was deeply touched with the broad-cast spirit of friendliness in which his brother was held in this city, and expressed himself as profoundly grateful for the manifestations he met on all sides.

It had been intended to ship the remains to the metropolis on the Undine, but that steamer's arrival here owing to an accident that befel her at Kalama yesterday, made it doubtful as to just what hour she would arrive and depart, hence, the evening express was chosen, and the body went forward at 6:10 o'clock last evening, in charge of the grieving kinsman.

All day long the remains of the well known and well liked young man lay in the undertaking parlors of Mr. Gilbaugh, and were visited by scores of devoted friends.
