POST-MORTEM HONORS PAID.

Mr. Matthew Sanders, a brother of the late Dolph Sanders, arrived in this city yesterday, from Portland, and was immediately in touch with the kind friends and fraters who had charge of the mortuary ceremonies programmed in his honor. He advised them that the family had changed its purpose of sending the body to the old home at McMinnville, and that it would be taken to Portland and there cremated. Mr. Sanders was deeply touched with the broad-cast spirit of friendliness in which his brother was held in this city, and expressed himself as profoundly grateful for the manifestations he met on all sides.

It had been intended to ship the remains to the metropolis on the Undine, but that steamer's arrival here, owing to an accident that befel her at Kalama yesterday, made it doubtful as to just what hour she would arrive and depart, hence, the evening express was chosen, and the body went forward at 6:10 o'clock last evening, in charge of the grieving kinsman.

All day long the remains of the well known and well liked young man lay in the undertaking parlors of Mr. Gilbaugh, and were visited by scores of devoted friends. At 5 o'clock they were taken in charge, jointly by the Knights of Pythias and the Eagles of this city, and led by the Eagle band of 22 pieces and followed by over two hundred of the fraters and friends of the dead man, the line of march was taken up to the depot, and it was a solemn and impressive escort, and indicated most plainly the genuine respect in which the young man was held in this community.

Dolph Sanders was the proprietor of the Commercial street tonsorial parlors, and enjoyed a large clientele, one of the best in the city. He was a man of quiet manners and tastes and had a kindly bearing that made him friends in unlimited numbers, and there is far-reaching sympathy for those he has left, and sorrow that he had to relinquish life at so early a period.
