Quiet Day in the Marine World of Astoria.

ALPENA DOWN FROM PORTLAND

Susie M. Plummer Ready for Sea—Rosecrans Arrives in With Monterey—Ship Empereur Menelik Down—Waterfront Notes.

The French ship Empereur Menelik came down from Portland yesterday on the lines of the Harvest Queen, and went to an anchorage in the lower bay. She will leave out for Limerick on the first tow-line over the bar.

The T. J. Potter yesterday brought down a 5,000 pound anchor for the use of the French bark La Perouse. The latter will down-take the earliest possible dispatch for sea and Europe.

The fine oil tanker Rosecrans entered port yesterday afternoon with the barge Monterey from San Francisco, and went directly to Portland, with Captain Patterson on the bridge.

The British bark Peter Iredale is now all by her "lonesome," Clark Loughery, who was watchman on her for forty-seven days, having been hailed off.

The steamer M. F. Henderson left yesterday morning immediately for Clifton, where she fastened on to two big rafts for the Portland mills.

The oil-tank steamer Asuncion came down from Portland yesterday and went to the lower harbor, along with the fleet of would-be-get-aways.

The four-masted schooner Alpena arrived down from Portland yesterday morning on the hawsers of the steamer M. F. Henderson, lumber laden for San Francisco.

The barkentine, Susie M. Plummer came down the river yesterday morning on the lines of the Oklahoma, with a big load of lumber from Portland for the Bay City.

The British bark Muskoka went to Portland yesterday morning on the hawsers of the Oklahoma and will load wheat for European delivery.

The steamer Johan Paulsen was among the arrivals from sea and California yesterday. She went on to Portland after a brief stop at the Elmore dock.

Notice to Mariners.

La Du Light, page 34, No. 129 (List of Lights, Buoys, and Daymarks, Pacific Coast, 1906, page 59).

On the northerly edge of the channel of the Columbia River, in 20 feet of water, and about 1-4 mile below La Du Wharf, Wash.

The single pile from which this light was shown was replaced November 28, by a cluster of three unpainted piles, having a white arm for lantern projecting from the center (highest) pile, without other change.

Alaska—Sitka Harbor, North Channel, page 97.—Channel Rock Buoy, 2, a red second-class iron spar, is reported, November 10, as being about 600 feet to the southward and eastward of its position. It will be replaced as soon as practicable.

Peril Straits, page 98—Rose Island Rock Buoy, 5, a black second-class can, is reported, November 25, as being 1-8 mile S. by W. of its position. It will be replaced as soon as practicable.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE COLUMBIA AVENUE.
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Common Council of the City of Astoria has declared its determination and intention to improve Columbia Avenue from the West end of Bond Street to a point 162 feet South of the South line of Taylor Avenue to the width of 30 feet upon the line that said street is now improved and on the established grade thereof. From the center line of the West end of Bond street to a point 160 feet South therefrom; the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking and hand rail and replacing the same with new decking and hand railing. The decking to be 4 by 12 inches, 30 feet long, and from said point 160 feet South from the West end of Bond street for a distance of 60 feet South, the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking, stringers caps and posts and planking and under-planning the street to the width of 30 feet, and from said point 220 feet South of the center line of Bond street to said point 102 feet South of the South line of Taylor Avenue, the improvement shall consist of removing all the old decking, caps and stringers and grading the street to the established grade, and planking the same with planks 4 by 12 inches to the width of 30 feet.
