Costa Rica to Be Hauled Off of Astoria Run.

PETER IREDAL A TOTAL WRECK

Marine News Very Meagre in This Port—Yosemite Arrives from San Francisco — Two Schooners Leave Out for Bay City.

The British bark Peter Iredal is now a complete wreck. Late Wednesday night, or early yesterday morning, she snapped in two, athwart ship, just forward of the main hatch, and now lies in two huge hulks, so that a person may walk straight through her. The falling of her main yard a few days ago at the height of the gale, had something to do with the final break-up, but it is due, of course, to the action of the quick-sands beneath her stern, allowing that portion to sink down and straining the keel until it snapped. She has about 150 tons of good coal on board, in one of her fore-hatches. All property on board is in possession of the underwriters, and they will take immediate steps to save all that can be taken care of and sold at any sort of profit.

The fine launch Pilot, Captain Jas. Keating, went into the towing business yesterday for a brief spell and shifted the bark Agate from her anchorage off the Elmore pier, to a point east of the O. R. & N. dock. She looked like an ant tugging away at a chip, while she was doing the work, but she did it all the same and did it right.

The news was received here yesterday morning that the steamship Costa Rica was so badly strained in her last encounter with the sea and wind, on her way to this port, that it will be imperative to haul her off for a thorough overhauling on the dry dock at San Francisco. The steamship Astec will make one more trip to ease off the freight congestion on this line, but the Columbia will have the bulk of

the business to do for some time to come.

The British bark Galena, wrecked on the same beach with the Iredale, is apparently all right, as yet, though the last storm has swung her broadside on to the sea, with her bows headed up the coast. This was caused by her cables chafing at the haw-pipes, and breaking. Captain Howell and his six men are still on board, and standing by her in good shape.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore will leave out for Tillamook this morning, if the weather permits. She is loaded to the guards with general merchandise.

The light-house steamer Heather is now en route to Seattle and home and should be here next week some time. She left Juneau on Sunday last.

The barkentine Susie M. Plummer was among the get-aways yesterday over the Columbia bar, bound for San Francisco.

The steamer Yosemite arrived in from San Francisco yesterday morning and went directly on to the metropolis.

The ship Empereur Menelik is in the lower harbor, ready for sea, the moment she can make it over the bar.

The schooner W. F. Jewett went over the bar yesterday bound for San Francisco.

J. J. Murray of Portland is in this city for a few days.

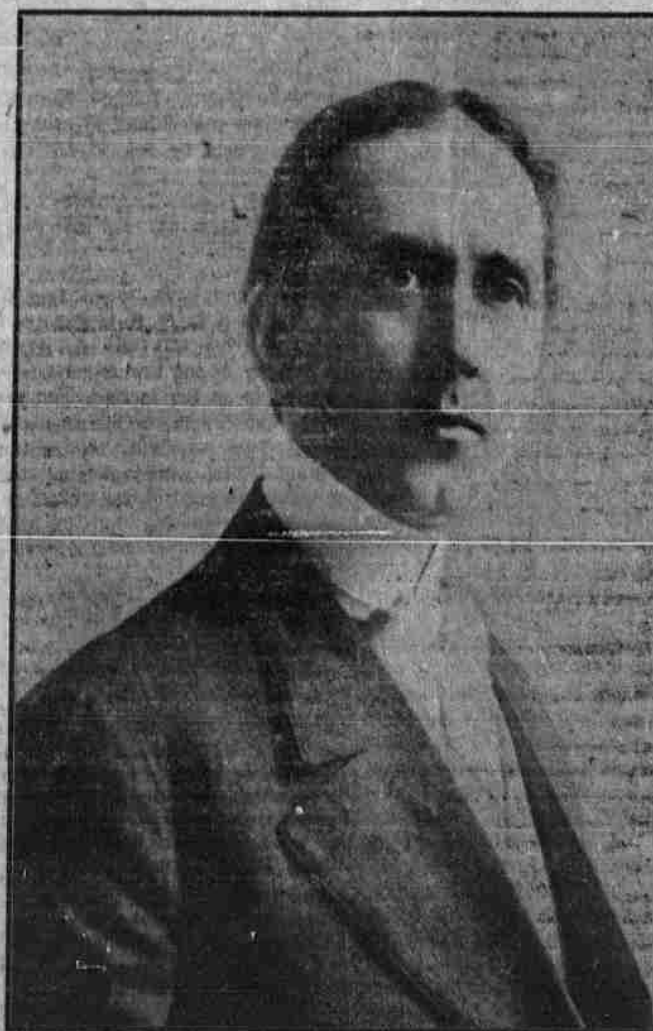
Mrs. Nettie Williams returns to her Seaside home today after a visit of several days with her daughters, Mrs. Stevens.
