

HONORABLE RECORD OF ASTORIA MAN

NELSON JOHANSEN, FORMERLY OF THIS CITY, DIES AT ARCATA, CALIF., RECENTLY AT THE ADVANCED AGE OF 70 YEARS.

A recent number of the Arcata, California, Union, contains the following obituary notice of a well known Astorian, who has many friends still in this city, and who will regret sincerely, his death, which occurred there, on the 8th of the present month:

"Another of our old and respected citizens, Nelson Johansen, passed away at his residence at the foot of H. street on Wednesday evening about 7:30 o'clock, after a short illness, the cause being paralysis. Mr. Johansen had suffered several slight strokes in the past, and the last one caused him to take to his bed, from which he never arose.

"Nelson Johansen was born in Hoe, Denmark, on September 12, 1837, and was 69 years 2 months and 23 days old at the time of his death. At the age of 14 he went to London, where he was apprenticed as a ship carpenter, working at the trade for about four years. Between the ages of 18 and 21 he engaged in mining in Australia. From there he went to China, where he spent three years in a government position, being attached for several months to the famous general Charles Gordon, better known as 'Chinese Gordon,' as one of his body guards. As far as known, Mr. Johansen was the last surviving member of this bodyguard. From China he went to the island of St. Thomas, where he held a position under the Danish government for several years, and then followed the sea for several years longer. In 1863 he came to San Francisco, leaving for Coos Bay shortly afterwards, where he obtained a pilot's license and spent some time piloting at that place. He was married in 1868 and had a son and a daughter by the union. The daughter and wife are since deceased and the son, Nelson B. Johansen, of Arcata, still survives. He was again married in 1884 at Roseburg, Ore., to

the present Mrs. Johansen, who survives him. After giving up piloting Mr. Johansen removed to Astoria, Oregon, and engaged in merchandising and salmon canning for about sixteen years. He came to Arcata in 1888, and built himself the comfortable home at the end of town, where he spent the remainder of his days in comfort, giving up active business.

"Deceased leaves two brothers, Holmes Johansen of Loleta, and Capt. Peter Johansen of Astoria, and a sister, Mrs. Ehsen, of Astoria. He also leaves a brother in Honolulu and two sisters and a brother in Denmark. He was a member of Beaver Lodge No. 35, I. O. O. F., of Astoria and a communicant in the Episcopal mission in Arcata.

"The subject of this sketch was a man of distinguished presence, a kind and loving husband and father, of good morals and strict integrity, and a model citizen. He will be missed from this community.

"The funeral was held from the family residence on Friday afternoon at 2 p. m. Rev. B. J. Darnelle officiated at the house and the officers of Anniversary Lodge took charge at the grave. The pallbearers were: W. W. Stone, Geo. Zehnder, J. McD. Moore, S. Myers, J. R. Brown and John L. Mitchell."

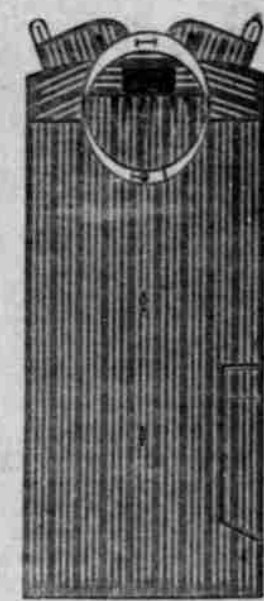

STATE HISTORY AND IT'S GUARDIANS

SECRETARY GEO. H. HIMES OF THE OREGON HISTORICAL SOCIETY, LOOKING UP PEOPLE AND THINGS OF INTEREST.

Secretary Geo. H. Himes, of the Oregon Historical Society, is down from Portland, on one of his semi-occasional tours of this historic old county, shaking hands with the members of the great society here, and discussing methods and means and purposes incidental to the progress of the task they have undertaken for the good of posterity.

In the course of a conversation yesterday morning with a reporter of the Astorian, Mr. Himes said, among other pleasant and useful things, that he had lately enjoyed a long talk with Mr. Azel H. Fish, of Islip, New York, a man devoted to the pursuit of history, and a lecturer of pronounced ability and standing, who is touring the coast at the present time on a course of lectures on historical topics, and that in the interchange of views between them, Mr. Fish, who has been lecturing upon the basis of information supplied from California sources, declared that he would be compelled to revise the entire text of his lectures on coast history, to conform to the authentic and more comprehensive data of the Oregon Society and thus give to his auditors and students of history, a more reliable expression of the great details, as he had gathered them from the records of the Oregon Society, which he joined in order to perfect his search into the realm of the past as it applied to Oregon. This is an indication of the excellence of the work done by Mr. Himes and his colleagues, and is creditable in the extreme.

During the past few weeks Mr. Himes has had the pleasure of entertaining as guests at the society headquarters at Portland, four professors from the California universities at Stanford and Berkeley, who have been delving into the data maintained there; and he says they were astonished and pleased at the volume and correctness of the records maintained by the society.

He reports everything going on smoothly and satisfactorily and is very much in earnest about securing the Congressional appropriation for the monument which is to be erected on the site of old Fort Clatsop in this county, and is invoking all the local influence possible in this behalf.

Another good piece of work done by the Oregon Society is the installation in the college libraries of the East of over two hundred volumes of the revised and approved histories of the Pacific northwest and of Oregon, particularly, as sources of instant and reliable reference for the teachers and students there, in matters of moment relating to this section.

Mr. Himes will be in the city all of today, and perhaps, tomorrow, and as usual, he is interminably busy.
