#### ACCIDENTS ON ICE.

City Youngsters Have Fine Time on the Hills With Sleds.

Yesterday every incline that would carry a coasting sled at all was pre-empted by the small boys and girls of Astoria. They literally swarmed on the sidewalks, and relished the first opportunity of the winter for a genuine "coast."

Among the hundreds to indulge in the pastime, there were several who had the misfortune to garner bumps and bruises and scratches galore, but there were a few who got more than that, notably "Chap" Ridgehaigh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Ridgehaigh, who was coasting with a score of his chums on the western grades of Commercial street. The night before, in anticipation of the morning's sport, they had adjusted a lot of discarded city planks to the intersections, so that their sleds would pass over the cross street without stopping, and the scheme might have worked like a charm, and did for a while, but during a fall in the fun, someone removed some of the planks and that without giving any of the boys notice of the fact, and when they resumed their play, "Chap" was the first to start out. He got under tremendous headway and when he came to the crossing that had been disturbed, he naturally sought to save himself by swerving clear of the path he was following, and in doing this crashed into an adjacent obstacle, cutting his scalp badly enough to require half a dozen stitches, which were sewed by Dr. Hemmerson. At first it was supposed he was dangerously hurt but last evening he was resting easily and with the abounding health of youth will be all right shortly.

A Costly Omission—The story is going the rounds that the Tongue Point Lumbering Company, in the course of its recent buy of valuable timber lands lying back of Oak Point in Washington, omitted to look after the necessary rights-of-way from the property then acquired to the river front and when they realized their mistake, the holders of the intervening ground, Brix Brothers of this city and the Hunan-Poulsen people of Portland, fixed a price of \$50,000 on the intervening territory, much to the discomfort of the big milling magnates. The deal is not yet closed, and unless this figure is met pretty promptly, the cost of the right-of-way will jump to a clean \$100,000. The present owners paid \$25,000 for the "neck of the woods" in question.

Thirty Thousand Dollar Deal—The Albion Packing company has closed a deal with the Albion Mercantile Company for all its interests and property, including wharves, warehouses, boats, sailing grounds, etc., etc., for a sum approximating \$30,000, and the price is deemed to be none too high for the purchase. All the several interests, including those of the Martin Both estate, are involved, and the tendency of the deal is to unify the business at that particular point.

Organist May Come—Rev. G. E. Rydquist of the First Evangelical Lutheran church, has received a communication from the agent of E. Russel Sanborn, the famous recital organist of the Pan-American Temple of Music. Mr. Sanborn is booking dates for a tour through the west, and if the lovers of good music in Astoria provide sufficient inducements, he will be heard here. It is hoped that the matter will be taken up, as it is a real treat to hear this popular musician.

Again Qualified—In conversation with a leading city official yesterday, a reporter of this paper was informed that the nineteen mills quoted in yesterday's issue as to the sum of the city levy, was erroneous and left a wrong impression. The city levied a tax of ten mills for general purposes, 1/2 mill for library and 1/2 mill for park purposes, making eleven mills in all, and that the eight mills was the school levy and not for city purposes at all. It is hoped this matter is now properly accounted for.
