Light House Tenders Both in Home Waters.

SHIP HALEWOOD CAPTURED

Arabia Off for China—Columbia Out for San Francisco—Formosa Arrives Down—Alliance Due Down This Morning.

The ocean tug Samson, after making a few needed repairs in Coos Bay, wrought by the late gale, in which she had to abandon her tow, the bark Big Bonanza, has gone to sea in search of the bark, and will find her, it is hoped, all right. The Big Bonanza is well manned and equipped, and if she had the good fortune to pull off the lee shore that threatened them both when she and the Samson parted company, will be found in due season and brought into this port.

The French ship Leo XIII, Captain Lucas, from Newcastle, N. S. W., arrived in port yesterday afternoon, after a fair run of 86 days. She brings a full cargo of Australian coal and is consigned to J. J. Moore & Company, at Portland. It is hoped her cargo is free from engagement, as it is badly needed in this part of the world.

The British ship alewood has ceased her peripatetic wanderings about the harbor, having fetched up in the North channel below Knappton, whence she was rescued by the Harvest Queen on Sunday afternoon and hauled to a safer anchorage under the lee of Tongue Point, where she will stay under her owners and Captain Brew ordain her next move.

The river steamer Elmore of the O. R. & N. service, came down from Portland on Sunday night, with a big cargo of lumber. The J. J. Potter she have brought down, but could not, owing to the fact that she is docked above the bridges at Portland and in the present swollen condition of the Willamette (which is literally alive with drift wood) it is dangerous to send the Potter through the draws under such circumstances.

The light-house tender Columbine went to sea and Tillamook Rock on Sunday morning and returned to port about sundown. Assistant Engineer Robert Warrack was on board and made full investigation of the Rock station, all to his complete satisfaction.

The steamship Columbia arrived down from Portland at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning and left out for San Francisco at 5:30. She was loaded to the guards and has plenty of people in her cabins. Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Carberry joined her at this port.

The British ship Glenalvon, Captain King, came down the river at 3 p. m. on Sunday, on the lines of the Harvest Queen, and went to anchor in the lower harbor. She is grain laden for Europe.

It is said the fine old racer, the Telephone, has been sold to a San Francisco steamer company, and will shortly go south for duty on the Sacramento river between the California capital and the Bay City.

The steamer Aurelia came down yesterday morning and is busy taking on her abandoned deck load at the Kinney dock. She will then go on to the Bay City.

The dandy light-house tender Heather, Captain William E. Gregory, has returned from a five weeks' cruise in northern and Puget Sound waters. All well on board.

The British bark Formosa, Captain Fretwurst, grain laden for Europe, came down the river on Sunday and will take the earliest possible dispatch over the bar.

The Portland-Asiatic liner Arabia arrived down from the metropolis on Sunday and succeeded in making the open sea on the noon flood.

The steamer San Gabriel, Captain Greene, was a Sunday get-away, leaving out for the Umpqua river, thence to San Pedro.
