PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—The prevailing cold snap has not materially affected the country supplies of produce and unless the cold weather should continue for some days longer it is not likely that egg production will fall off to any great extent. Supplies are thought to be very temporarily held back, but the present tight receipts have caused quite a stiffening in price, the quotation today being very generally named at 32½¢, with small lots of extra fancy and closely candied goods bring ½¢ more.

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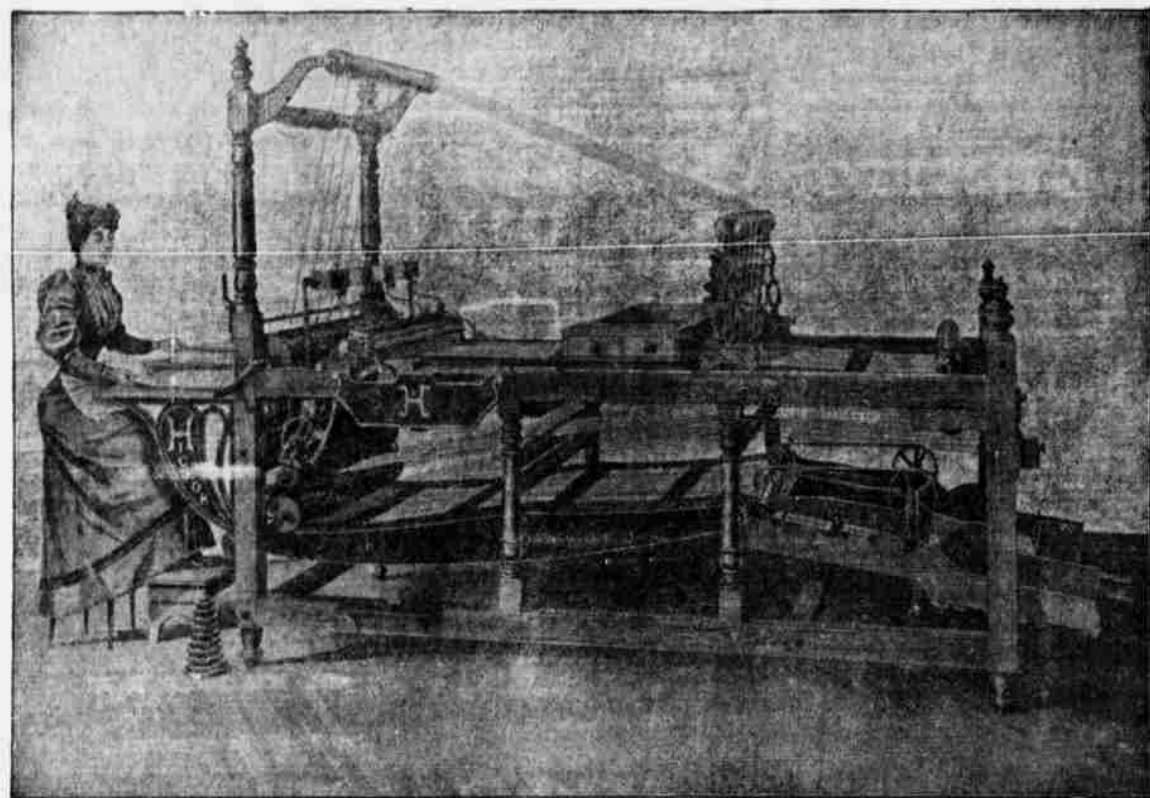
