PORTLAND, Jan. 23.—Eggs continue weak, today's quotations dropping to 32¢@33¢, with receipts rather too heavy.

Butter remains steady on decreased receipts, good country creamery being nearly on a parity with city.

There were rather liberal receipts of veals and hogs this morning and butchers found no trouble in getting about what they needed. Prices remain unchanged.

DRAW ACID FROM AIR

Crops Will Be Double Through Cheap Nitric Fertilizer.

PROBLEM IS AT LAST SOLVED

After Hundred Years of Experimenting Scientists Have Found Practical Method of Manufacturing Substitute for Nitrate of Soda.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—When scientists read yesterday the cable report of Sir William Crooke's method of extracting nitric acid from the atmosphere, they said there was no longer any fear of a scarcity of food from overpopulation, because the result of the discovery would be a doubling of the world's crops. Nitric acid adds greatly to the productivity of the soil.

Nitrate of soda, used for that purpose, now has grown so scarce, it is said that it will soon be exhausted. At present the process of extracting nitric acid from the air is expensive. Professor Charles F. Chandler, head of the Department of Chemistry of Columbia University explained, but said that with the cheapening of electricity, which is employed in the process, nitric acid manufactured by the new method would be cheaper than nitrate of soda.

"When a practical working process is perfected," said Professor Chandler, "every waterfall in the country will be available for the production of the atmospheric fertilizer. Scientists have been working on this problem for a hundred years, but real headway has only been made recently."

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—A tumble in the price in cereal foods all over the world and a vast increase in the crops of farmers in all lands—such is the result foreseen by Chicago experts in agricultural chemistry as the sequel of Sir William Crooke's discovery of a method of extracting nitric acid from the atmosphere.

Local authorities declared yesterday that if the cablegram were correct in saying that the method was sufficiently perfect to be of value commercially, then a most important effect would be had on the raising of cereals.

It is prophesied that farmers will be enabled to get a far greater yield from their land than had been the case in the past if nitrates are cheapened so they can be used to a larger extent for fertilizer.
