

**WEDDING ENDS CASE**

**Gives Bond to Care for Wife and Child.**

**SENSATIONAL CASE IS ENDED**

**Marries Woman He Had Betrayed, After He Was Arrested on Charge of Seduction—Families Are Prominent.**

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 25.—The marriage of Walter S. McCauley and Amelia Villa ends one of the most sensational cases ever on the Superior Court docket in Walla Walla county. McCauley was to have been tried Friday, January 25, for betraying Miss Villa, but the wedding will have the effect of practically dismissing the charge as Prosecuting Attorney Otto Rupp will consent to the case being continued. It is understood that McCauley has agreed to furnish a bond to care for his wife and child for three years.

Intense interest was taken in the case, because of the prominence of both parties concerned in the case. McCauley's property interests in this city are large. Miss Villa is the daughter of the late Francisco Villa, a wealthy retired gardener, who died last week, and a sister of the famous Frank Villa, who once made the All-American football team.

Arrangements had been made to have the ceremony performed early this week, but Mr. McCauley suffered an attack of heart trouble, and the wedding was postponed. Today, however, the ceremony was performed in the office of Dr. Y. C. Blacklock, Justice J. J. Huffman officiating. Mr. McCauley was barely able to have the ceremony performed. Prior to McCauley's arrest at Spokane, several weeks ago, an effort was made by the Villa family to have McCauley marry Miss Villa. Frank Villa, the brother, is said to have driven to Mr. McCauley's rooms and to have forced him to agree to the ceremony. McCauley stepped into another room to change his clothes, and while Villa was waiting, let himself out another door and went to Spokane, where he remained until his arrest.

**LEAVES TO CHARITY.**

**Texas Millionaire Believed to Have Remembered Charitable Works.**

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—Charity, it is said, will be a large beneficiary of the estate of the late O. A. Slaughter who died at San Antonio, Tex., last Tuesday. The late broker's estate, according to persons in close touch with his business affairs is valued at approximately \$2,000,000.

The bulk of Mr. Slaughter's holdings, outside of the charitable bequests, it is said, will go to the late broker's sons, A. O. Slaughter, Jr. and Rochester B. Slaughter, and to his half-daughter, Mrs. Wentworth Field.

The estate consists of largely railroad bonds and securities in various corporations accumulated by Slaughter in his many years of business activity in Chicago.

In addition to this Mr. Slaughter owned vast property interests in the West, his principal holdings being in Kansas and Texas. In Galveston, Tex., the broker held title to a business block valued at several hundred thousand dollars and in Kansas City he also had real estate holdings which consisted of several pieces of business property, some of which is improved and said to be valued at more than \$50,000.

**SUPPRESS CLEO.**

**Changes in Play Said to Have Hurt Vanity of Author.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—"Cleo" the new play by Edwin Milton Boyle, in which Mrs. Leslie Carter was advertised to appear at the Hudson theatre February 11, and the management of Charles Dillingham, may not be produced. Yesterday Mr. Boyle obtained a temporary injunction of the Supreme Court restraining the production of the play.

The statement is made that ever since Mr. Boyle was commissioned to write "Cleo" which is a revised version of "Article Forty-seven," there has been friction between him and Mrs. Carter. Mr. Boyle refused to be interviewed yesterday but last night Mrs. Boyle explained that her husband had been moved to obtain the injunction because the manuscript of

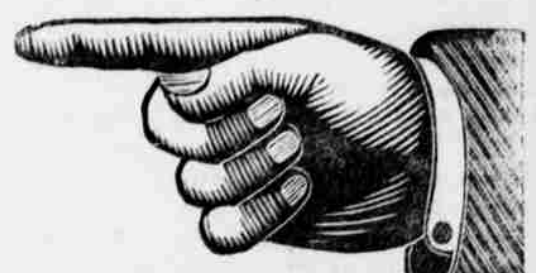

**EPIDEMIC WORSE.**

**Startling Conditions Discovered in Chicago by Health Inspectors.**

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—The combined efforts of the Health Department, building department and factory inspectors offices showed results yesterday in a marked decrease in the number of scarlet fever cases reported. This result however was accompanied by the greatest number of new cases of diphtheria reported in any day of the epidemic as well as an increase in the actual number of deaths from contagious diseases.

There were nine deaths during the day, 67 new cases of diphtheria were reported and there were 17 cases of scarlet fever.

The work of the health department inspectors and these sent out by Building Commissioner Bartzen resulted in many significant discoveries, one little girl was found to have died of diphtheria without medical attention; the principal of a school was reported to have continued his duties, going to and from his home, where his two children were confined with scarlet fever; and inspectors from the factory inspector's office found many violations in the city's sweatshops.

**WORLD'S LARGEST DAM.**

**Will Make Helena Montana Second Greatest Electric Producer.**

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 25.—A Helena dispatch to the Miner says the gates will close in the Hauser Lake dam this morning. It will be three weeks before the power is turned on, as it will take this time for the lake to fill. The water will back up eighteen miles in

the river and through the Prickly Pears canyon, six miles in the valley below Helena. The dam is 640 feet long and seventy feet wide and is made of steel throughout. The dam is the largest of its kind in the world.

Fifteen thousand horsepower will be generated and this, with the Canyon Ferry plant, will make Helena the largest producer of electricity in any place in the country with the exception of Niagara. The power will run the Washoe reduction works, the Anaconda Railway, light that city and operate many of the little lines.

**BUYS STATION.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The Herald today says: Plans are under consideration by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, for the purchase from the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company of the latter's Park Square station property in Boston. It is understood that the price demanded for the property by the New Haven is in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000. That negotiations are under way was admitted yesterday by William H. Newman, president of the New York Central.

**TARIFF LEAGUE MEETS.**

**Puts Itself on Record as Favoring Dual Tariff Law.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—At its 22nd annual meeting yesterday the American Protective Tariff League recorded itself in favor of a dual tariff, "provided that the minimum tariff on foreign products shall at all times fully represent the difference in the cost of the production of all nations which discriminate against the exports of the United States."

These officers were elected: President, Charles A. Moore; vice president, W. F. Draper and John E. O. Reyburn; treasurer and secretary, Wilbur E. Wakeman.
