TOKIO, Jan. 30 .- Viscount Hayashi, oreign minister, in reply to a question in the House, expressed deep approbriation of the sympathetic attitude of the United States government in he recent trouble in San Francisco, "Having the sympathy of the American government," he said, "Japan must remain a looker on until a decision shall have been reached in the test case in the California courts. in the event of an unfavorable declaion the anti-Japanese movement in California will be considered to represent the opinion of the whole United States, which would require diplomatic djustment."

Viscount Hayashi said he did not believe there would be such a developnent


#### PETER'S PENCE SCARCE.


