SOUNDS WARNING NOTE.

Japanese Foreign Minister Speaks Upon San Francisco Trouble.

TOKIO, Jan. 30.—Viscount Hayaishi, foreign minister, in reply to a question in the House, expressed deep approbation of the sympathetic attitude of the United States government in the recent trouble in San Francisco. "Having the sympathy of the American government," he said, "Japan must remain a looker on until a decision shall have been reached in the test case in the California courts. In the event of an unfavorable decision the anti-Japanese movement in California will be considered to represent the opinion of the whole United States, which would require diplomatic adjustment."

PETER'S PENCE SCARCE.

Vatican Denies Report That Contributions Are Plentiful.

ROME, Jan. 30.—Complaint is made at the Vatican regarding the reports that have become current that large offerings of Peter's pence are pouring in from all parts of the world. It is stated that the reports are spread by persons evilly disposed with a view of discouraging the faithful from sending money to the fund. Far from having a surplus, it is stated, this fund is diminishing and this is a serious matter just now when the need of money is increasing.
