RUMORE OF WAR.

Serious Insurrection May Take Place Against President Castro.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—According to the Tribune General Emilio Fernandez, ex-Governor of Caracas, who is now in this city, has decided to join in an insurrection, now said to be contemplated against the Castro government.

General Fernandez will throw his lot with General Antonio Pardo who is now in the West Indies preparing for the reported movement against the Castro government.

General Fernandez will sail for the West Indies in about a week. This announcement by Fernandez, the Tribune says, is of great importance, as General Fernandez is known as an able military leader and has a large following in Venezuela.

BRAIN WAS TROUBLE.

Minister Credits His Many Marriages to Cerebral Disorder.

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—A dispatch to the Record Herald from Toledo, O., says:

Charged with bigamy and credited with having 13 wives by the court officers, Rev. Albert Holden, reported to have two sons also under indictment for bigamy, pleaded guilty yesterday and was sentenced to serve six years in the penitentiary.

Just before sentence was passed, Holden said to the judge that he had been the victim of brain trouble and blamed his many marriages on this affliction. He said that he had struggled against the sin of bigamy, but that all his prayers had availed him nothing.

STAGE CAPSIZED.

Goes Over Steep Bank With Four Men Near Deadwood.

REDDING, Cal., Jan. 31.—The stage from Redding to Weaverville was capsized over a steep bank yesterday evening at a point a mile below Deadwood. Six horses were attached to the stage and three passengers were aboard.

The passengers were M. O. Lovelidge, J. H. Monroe and R. K. Finlayson, all mining men from Victoria, B. C. Lovelidge is the only passenger who was hurt, but not seriously.

FLAGS NOT TOYS.

Importers of National Emblems Must Pay Silk Duty on Them.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—"We do not think the American flag, however diminutive it may be, is commercially, commonly or nationally regarded as a plaything for children and we find that the flags in dispute are not toys."

This was the verdict of the Board of United States General Appraisers in the case of a shipment of miniature silk flags, imported by a toy firm as toys.

The decision was rendered yesterday, the flags having been made in Japan and shipped at a 35 per cent duty. The flags being taxed as silk were taxed 50 per cent.

SILVER WORKERS STRIKE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The Brotherhood of Silver Workers, which has made a general demand all over the country for a nine hour working day at ten hours pay, has decided to enforce this in the vicinity of New York.
