PORTLAND, Jan. 31.—The recent advance in water freight rates from San Francisco to this port has resulted in an advance in jobbers prices on commodities affected.

The heavy snows along the northern tier of states have upset freight transportation arrangements to quite a serious extent. A number of staples are becoming alarmingly low in jobbers' hands and in some instances have been depleted entirely.

Eastern flour for this market is scattered along the way from Minneapolis, several cars being hung up somewhere in Montana.

LESS WINDOW GLASS.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 31.—At a meeting held here of the National Brokerage Company, representing all independent window glass manufacturers of the country yesterday, it was unanimously agreed to curtail the production.

Innumerable employees who expected steady work until late in June, will be laid off at various periods between early next month and the two months following and will not again return to work until September, the time for the fall re-opening of factories.

Their claim is that the market is overstocked and that some curtailment is necessary if present selling prices are to be maintained.

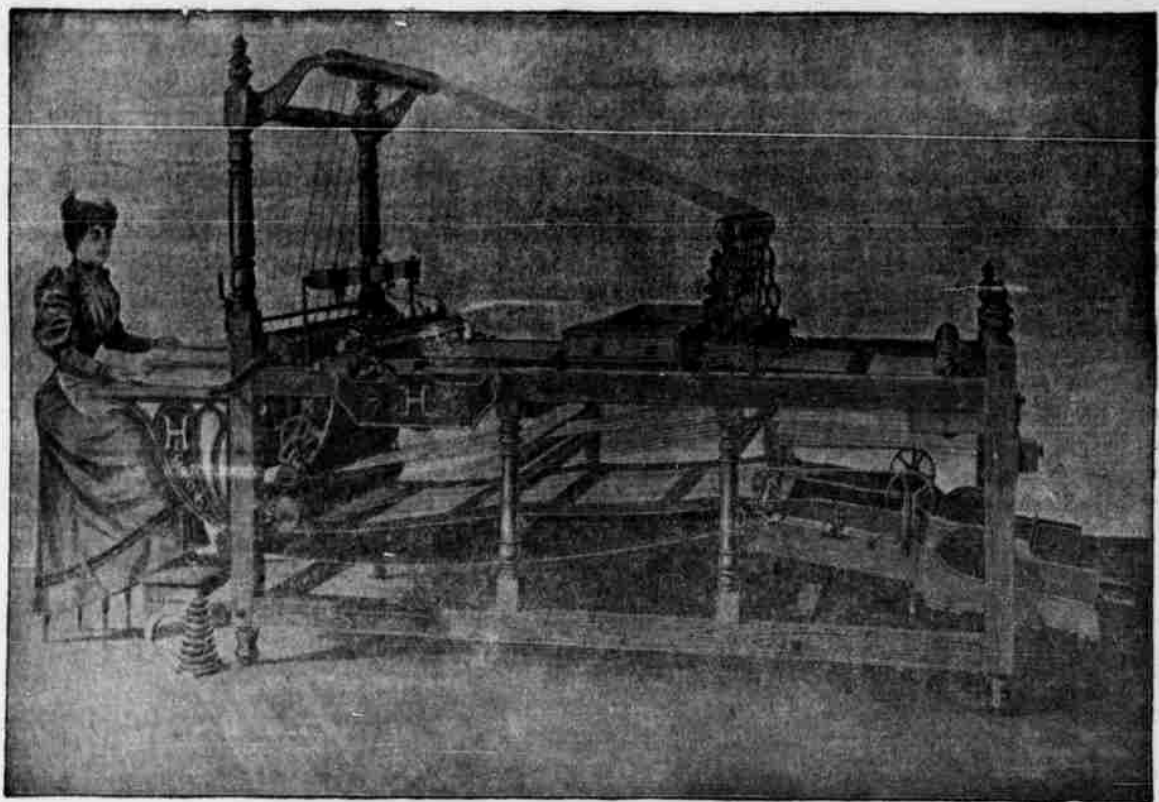
