

MARINE MEMORANDA

Sou'easter Ties Up Local Shipping Here.

SCHOONER SOLANO IS ASHORE

See Tug Samson and Barge Washington Aground Up River—Captain Keating's Experience With Pilot—Fleet Due Today.

Word was received in this city yesterday noon announcing that the schooner Solano, from San Francisco to Gray's Harbor, in ballast, was ashore on North Beach, near Ocean Park, at a point very close to the scene of the wreck of the British ship Glen Morag. She went ashore early in the morning and there are no details at hand as to her position and the chance of getting her off. It is said the North Head live-saving crew were promptly alongside and that all hands, nine men, were safely landed, with such of their effects as could be reached quickly. The Solano is a four-masted vessel of 728 tons gross and 692 tons net; 176 feet long, 40 feet beam, 14½ feet depth of hold, and was built at Benicia, California, in 1901.

Cathlamet wants a regular daily boat between that port and this. Here is an opportunity for the Astoria merchants to show their newly awakened enterprise. Why not lease a steamer big enough for the run and its demands as to passengers and freight? The revenue from the service ought to be ample to cover the charter, and the boat would contribute handsomely to the trade of the city, provided the Cathlametians want the same bad enough. It is worth looking into, just by way of exercising the public spirit of both places.

The last news of the sea tug Samson, bound down from Portland with the barge Washington in tow, for San Francisco, was, that she was hard and fast aground on the bar at the mouth of the Willamette river and the barge likewise, yesterday morning. Captain Loh, her old master, is again in charge of her. The high water due down there yesterday was likely to be welcome enough to him, at all events.

Captain Jim Keating returned to this city with the motor launch Pilot yesterday forenoon, after a long and dismal night on the Svensen sands without any nourishment, or other creature comforts of any kind. He was up the river with Sheriff Pomeroy and Deputy McLean on their quest for the Holbrook trouble makers, and got stuck badly.

There is beginning to be a bit of nervousness about the barkentine Puako, up from Guatemala, with coal in ballast to S. Elmore & Company. She was reported off the Columbia bar early last week and was compelled to go to deep water again. She is new to these waters, from all accounts.

The steamer T. J. Potter came down yesterday morning in the very teeth of the gale and it took her two hours

to make it across the bay from Brookfield to the O. R. & N. piers. She went up at 10 o'clock, doing good business both ways.

The French ship Bayard is still at her lower bay anchorage, awaiting a chance to cross out. It is said she has one of her crew in irons for delivery to the French authorities for crime committed on board, but just what it is has not yet developed.

The steamer Thomas L. Wand is due down this morning, lumber laden for San Francisco, and the steamers Geo. W. Elder and Nome City should be leading her, or closely in her wake.

The China liner Aragona, with her Jersey dairy still on board and in good working order, was still in the city channels yesterday evening, but her master hopes to get to sea today.

The steamer Johan Poulsen is down from Portland, on her way to the Bay City, with one of her big loads of lumber from her owning company's mills at the metropolis.
