PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—Locally the market is at a standstill, there being no chance to move stocks from the country—rail trouble, high water, bad roads and recent unfavorable weather combining to cause a stoppage in shipments.

Fortunately stocks in dealers' warehouses are fairly large and are held steady against the demands of city trade.
