PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—Locally the market is at a standstill, there being no chance to move stocks from the country—rail trouble, high water, bad roads and recent unfavorable weather combining to cause a stoppage in shipments.

Fortunately stocks in dealers' warehouses are fairly large and are held steady against the demands of city trade.

Sweet potato stocks are falling low and but few more are expected.
