THE ARCH-OUTRAGE OF THE SESSION

ASTORIA'S CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GOES ON RECORD AGAINST "PORT OF COLUMBIA" BILL.

The following correspondence is entirely self-explanatory and will be read with interest since it deals with a matter closely affecting every property owner in this county, and should invoke the instant and unqualified protest of every man able to say a word or a thing, in opposition to the outrage premeditated. The Astorian is wide-open for all protests:

"Astoria, Feb. 9, 1907.

"Dear Sir—In reply to your letter of the 4th inst. just received, we have to say that the County Court and the Astoria Progressive Association have objected to the formation of the Port of Columbia.

"The Chamber of Commerce has instructed the undersigned to object to Clatsop county being included in the port. The Chamber feels that the State of Oregon is as equal a body as should take charge of the matter of pilotage and towage. Portions of Washington, as well as Idaho are as much interested and it does not seem fair that the burden should be thrown upon a few.

"We understand from the ship owners in Europe that there will not be many more sail-vessels come to this port or the coast, as they have given way to steam.

"We feel further that the main thing is to get plenty of water on the bar, and that their masters will regulate themselves. For these reasons we are unable to assent to the bill proposed.
