ESTABLISHED 1886. Capital \$100,000. American Committee Will Be Formed to Aid Russia. MILLIONS FIGHTING HUNGER. Estimates State That Half a Million Persons Will Die of Starvation and Exposure Before Another Crop Can Be Raised.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—A meeting to organize an American committee to aid the Russian famine sufferers will be held next Thursday in the rooms of the New York School of Philanthropy, United Charities building. The call for the meeting is signed by R. Fulton Cutting, Felix Adler, Bishop David H. Greer, Edward T. Devine, James Speyer, Nicholas Murray Butler, Jacob H. Schiff and J. Pierpont Morgan. Nicholas A. Schishkoff, of Samara, Russia, who has just arrived from the famine stricken provinces, will address the meeting. Mr. Schishkoff who is of the hereditary nobility of Russia, a liberal leader and member of council of the Empire during the session of the last Douma, said yesterday: 'Over an area three quarters the size of the United States, 30,000,000 famine stricken people are fighting hunger and disease with pitifully small resources of their own and little outside aid. According to even conservative accounts, twenty seven provinces have had bad harvests; sixteen of them very bad and eleven practically none. In my own province of Samara, before the next harvest can be gathered, one half million people will have starved to death or died from hunger, and exposure.'
