STRIKE PROBABLE.

Engineers on Lake Shore and Michigan Differ With Employes.

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—The breaking of negotiations yesterday between the local Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railroad officials and a committee representing the engineers, because of the failure to agree on wage matters, caused some uneasiness over the prospect of a strike. Last night the engineers sent around to Vice President W. C. Brown of the New York Central system, for a special conference.

Since November 1 the employes have been attempting to reach a settlement with C. E. Schaff, in charge of the traffic department of the Lake Shore road west of Buffalo. An increase in wages proportionate to that given recently on many of the western Vanderbilt lines was asked, together with some other new conditions.

G. C. Redhead, chairman of the Engineers Committee said the matter would be taken to the highest officials of the New York Central lines, but that no radical action will be considered until a response has been received from Vice President Brown.

LEGAL OBSTRUCTIONS.

California Laws Must be Changed Before Japanese Question is Settled.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21.—City and County Attorney Burke in discussing the Japanese school question today as altered by new agreement, said:

"If the Japanese children over 16 years of age are to be kept out of our public schools, statute 1662 of the civil code will have to be repealed by the legislature.

The statute makes provision that all children between the ages of 16 and 21 shall be allowed to enter our public schools, except for certain reasons. In case the Japanese are allowed to enter our general schools, a new statute will have to be framed, if the school board wishes to keep those over 16 years of age out of the schools.

"The statute, also provides that in case an oriental school is provided, the children of the people so specified shall attend no other. Hence the present Oriental school must be abolished, to allow the Japanese to enter our schools. But if the Oriental school is not abolished, then children so specified must attend that school and no other. The statute specifies children of Mongolian descent and we shall insist until proved the Japanese are not of Mongolian descent."
