QUIET ON THE WATERFRONT

Aurelia Sails For San Francisco Schooner Inca Off For San Pedro—Americana Arrives In—Alpena Goes Over the Bar—Odd Notes.

Repairs to the steamship Alliance will be completed by the end of the present week, and the vessel is scheduled to sail for Coos Bay points Saturday night. Her hull has been cleaned and painted and repairs to her machinery will be finished in time to undergo inspection. The steamer will be painted inside and out. Hereafter the Alliance will operate only between Portland and Coos Bay points. For some time past she has made Eureka, but this port has been abandoned. Freight offerings for Coos have been so heavy that it was found impossible to continue in the California service.

The gasoline steamer Berwick, Captain Jacobsen, left down from Portland yesterday morning for Coos Bay and Rogue River. She has a full load of reight for Marshfield and a lot of cannery supplies for Rogue River. The Berwick has been at Portland for at least two months, and during that time has had an ice machine installed. Hereafter she will carry frozen salmon from the Southern Oregon river to Portland.

The schooner Manzanita went on the drydock at Portland yesterday and all necessary repairs will be made and all necessary repairs will be made to her hull. The hole made by the collision with the dredge Columbia will be closed and new ribs and knees will be put in. When the vessel is lowered from the

dock she will be in condition to go to sea.

The marine world of Astoria is in quiescent mood these past few days there being hardly enough craft moving to make a decent chronicle much less to fill the pages of a live newspaper. But, they're a-comin'.

The steamship Geo. W. Elder is due down from Portland at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning and will leave out in a hurry in order to take advantage of the morning tides.

The schooner Inca which has been loading at the Old Oregon Mills cleared from the custom house here yesterday, with 1,350,000 feet of lumber bound for San Pedro.

The steamer J. B. Stetson went to sea from this port yesterday, with all the lumber she could carry, San Francisco bound.

The steamer Aurelia came down the river yesterday morning and went to sea on the afternoon flood.

The schooner Americana came in from San Pedro yesterday, after a swift trip up the coast.

The schooner Alpena went to sea yesterday afternoon lumber laden for the port of San Diego.

THE THINNING HOST.

Death of the Late John Warnstaff, Deplored Throughout Clatsop.

The news of the death of John Warnstaff, an old and deeply respected pioneer citizen of the Young's River country in this county, was received in this city yesterday with many manifestations of sincere regret on all sides. He passed away at his home on the 4th of this month, the fatal malady being heart trouble.

Mr. Warnstaff was born in Lafayette, a little town on the Wabash river in Indiana, on August 8, 1830 and grew to his youth there, marrying happily nineteen years later, Miss Jane Blakes being his bride. With all the world before them they faced the perils of the great dim trail across the continent in 1852 with an ox team and settled in Portland for a year or more. They came on to Astoria in 1854 and from that day to this they and their progeny have been honored citizens of this famous old colony.

The deceased gentleman was a valued member of the Oregon Historical Society and was revered and loved not only by his colleagues in that exclusive circle, but in every walk and phase of his relation to man.

He leaves to mourn him the faithful wife of his youth, five sons and daughters, and fourteen grandchildren: Mrs. N. C. Hillery, of Centralia, Washington; G. W. Warnstaff, of the same place; Mrs. W. J. Heckard, of Watsonville, California; W. J. Warnstaff, of Milford, California; Albert Warnstaff, of Astoria; and Elmer and Elsie Warnstaff, of Young's River.

Funeral services will be held at the Young's River family home at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, and interment will be had at Greenwood cemetery, the boat leaving the Callender pier promptly at 1 o'clock.

THE DAY IN CIRCUIT COURT

SLIM DOCKET YESTERDAY IN THE HIGHER TRIBUNAL—HON. J. C. McCUE APPOINTED DEPUTY BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY HEDGES.

Things were very quiet in the higher court yesterday, no trial being before the tribunal.

The jury in the case of John Stephens, onson versus P. A. Peterson, brought in a verdict of recovery for the full sum sued for, \$125, and did not take very long in reaching the conclusion, either. Judgment was given in accordance with the verdict.

The grand jury made but one report yesterday, that of a true bill against Fred Olson, for alleged selling of liquor without a license, and he was arraigned at once, his trial being set to follow that of the State of Oregon versus Julius Wilson, et al., and the latter case has been set next after the trial of Captain M. M. Fox, which is fixed for April 30 next, and it may be that all cases will go over to the June term.

In the case of C. C. Clark, versus Katie Clark, for divorce, a decree was granted as prayed for and judgment entered therefore.

In the matter of the suit of A. W. Martin versus J. M. Martin, for divorce, similar action was taken and recorded.

District Attorney Hedges has announced the appointment of Hon. John C. McCue, of this city, as his deputy for Clatsop county, and Mr. McCue was the recipient of expressed good will all day long yesterday by his many friends throughout the city. He has a big advantage over many other men who might have had the post had he not been selected, and that is that he is on the threshold of his legal career, with no hampering ties to bind or annoy him and will give the first fruits of his professional work to this important line of practice. Everybody wishes him genuine success.

It is expected that the grand jury will close its labors for the term sometime today and return to the milder and pleasanter pursuits of private life. There is but one public matter yet awaiting treatment at its hands and there is a good deal of conjecture as to what will be the course recommended, namely, the case of C. Roy Fox, charged with the murder of Blanche Day, who was taken from the Wallport concert hall to die at the hospital of St. Mary's, some weeks ago.

Yesterday morning, however, the dog had returned and Beaseley knew that he was trouble again, and shouldered his gun, and horn started back over his trail of the day before. He blew his horn incessantly, and listened eagerly for some response, and was at last rewarded by a faint call that he knew must come from his prized hunter. So he kept on blowing and waiting for the answer, and finally he located the animal about three quarters of a mile away, and followed down the trail until he found the poor dog at the foot of a big tree, and to his surprise through the limbs, the ball having entered the animal's side. The stricken beast was wonderfully glad to see his master again, and could only manifest his joy by happy whining and licking his hand whenever it came within reach of him. He could not even get upon his feet, and Mr. Beaseley gathered him up in his arms and carried him bodily three miles down to the Home

mills at Tongue Point, where the kindly superintendent supplied him with a horse and wagon and "Drummer" was instantly healed to the friendly care and kennels of Ed. Llewellyn in this city, yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Llewellyn went to work on the dog at once and did all that his wide skill suggested to save him, but he was dubious from the first examination he made, and so called in Dr. Pilkington, another lover of animals and their devoted friend when in difficulty, and the doctor made an incision at a point where it was thought the bullet was lodged, but it could not be found. "Drummer" stood all the manhandling and kidding incident to these efforts to save him and never whimpered once, but last night all hands had about given him up. His master is particularly grieved for the dog was a really fine animal and his devoted companion at home and in the woods, and he had broken him to the field from his puppy hood.

From all indications, it is certain the dog was maliciously shot by someone and good luck.
