Another Good Sign—Manager Brunold, of the Pacific States Telephone service in this city, has a gang of work men engaged in tearing down and out the old superstructure encumbering the company's lot on Exchange street, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, preparatory to the erection of the new and handsome headquarters it is to maintain in this city. Another good sign and one that is entirely welcome in Astoria.

Business in Astoria—Mr. J. M. Craig, the pacific coast Manager for the Brown-Forman company of Louisville, Kentucky, and Mr. Emil Waldman, their local representative, were in the city last week in the interest of their firm. They have arranged with the American Importing Company, to handle their goods, their leading brands being "Old Forester," "Old Tucker" and "Mayor Paul" whiskies. We congratulate them on making such good connections as the American Importing Company, and can predict only the greatest success for them.

Off For The South—Max Mase, the well known sash foreman in the Clatsop Mills of this city, has received a flattering offer to go to Los Angeles in a like capacity, and will leave this evening for the Southland. His family will follow him later, when he shall have made things comfortable for their reception there. Fitzgerald were appointed appraisers of said estate; Ole E. Jeldness, the son and partner in business of the decedent, was appointed administrator of the partnership estate of his father, with bonds fixed at \$3,000. In the matter of the estate of Duncan McMillan, P. E. Petersen was appointed administrator of said estate with bonds set at the sum of \$3,800; and Max Young, John Frye and O. F. Morton were named as appraisers. In the matter of the estate of Karl Smittenberg, deceased, the hearing of the final account of the administrator was set for 10 o'clock a. m. on April 15, 1907.

## GRAND JURY REPORT

Filed in the Circuit Court Yesterday.

### PROCEEDINGS OF THE DAY

Grand Jury Discharged For The Term—Cases Disposed of—Petit Jury Excused Until April 3d—Current Matters.

Following is the full text of the report filed by the Clatsop county Grand Jury, yesterday afternoon, with Judge Thomas A. McBride, in the Circuit Court, after the presentation of which the Grand Jury was discharged from further service, with the thanks of the Court:

Astoria Ore., March 6, 1907.  
"To the Honorable Circuit Court of Clatsop County, state of Oregon:

"Gentlemen:—We, your Grand Jurors duly empanelled and sworn for the county of Clatsop, and State of Oregon, for the year 1907, respectfully submit this, our final report as follows: "We have inquired into and investigated all charges of crime that have been called to our attention and have returned four true bills and three not true bills.

"We have investigated, as has been the usual custom of Grand Jurors in the past and visited and inquired into the conduct of the various county offices.

"We find all the officers of the county to be able and efficient, and while deploring the conditions that exist as far as insufficient and improper quarters for the various officers is concerned, we wish to commend them for the careful manner in which their respective offices have been conducted.

"The system in vogue in the County Clerk's office, and also in the office of the County Assessor we especially commend.

"We find the county jail to be insecure and unsanitary, and recommend that as soon as practicable, upon the completion of the new court house, now under course of construction, that suitable and safe quarters be provided for the housing and caring of the county prisoners.

"A great part of the time of your Grand Jury has been taken up investigating the conditions that exist as far as the dance halls on Astor street in the City of Astoria, are concerned and in this respect we wish to state that we have returned an indictment for felony against three parties connected with the Waldorf dance hall in the City of Astoria.

"We cannot denounce too strongly the vicious manner in which the last named institution has been conducted and we wish to urge upon the peace officers of the City of Astoria, and to those to whom is entrusted the enforcement of the laws of the City of Astoria and State of Oregon, that proper steps be taken to remedy the conditions that exist in the Waldorf dance hall and remove this most vicious institution from the country.

"There have been a great many alleged violations of the law, and so far as the last named place is concerned and while believing that it is the sentiment of the citizens of the county generally, that this evil should be suppressed, we regret to state that in all except the instance above mentioned, and in the case of C. Roy Fox, against whom your Grand Jury has returned an indictment for inducing a minor to enter a house of prostitution which, in this case, was the Waldorf dance hall, that an insufficiency of evidence prevented your Grand Jury from returning further indictments against the dance hall named.

"Now, having completed our labors we beg to be discharged, (signed) "E. C. Jeffers, Foreman, W. R. Christensen, Clerk, P. Lawlor, E. Hauke, E. F. Libke, Jacob Sture, John W. Benecke, Grand Jurors."

The one case of moment submitted in the upper court yesterday was that of the Acme Grocery Company, of this city, versus the City of Astoria. Demurrants to the legal and constitutional status of the fifteen amendments to the charter of the City of Astoria adopted at the last municipal election in December, 1906, George Noland, of Noland & Smith appearing for the plaintiffs and City Attorney C. H. Abercrombie, for the city, Judge McBride gave judgment for the city, and declared the amendments valid and legal in all respects. In the further prosecution of this important matter, the attorney for plaintiffs will immediately

file an appeal and the case will go to the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon, for final adjustment.

The members of the petit jury were summoned into court and excused from service until the third day of April, next.

The parties at interest in the case of John Stephenson versus P. A. Petersen, which was before a jury on Monday last and a verdict given plaintiff for the amount sued for, appeared in open court yesterday and dismissed the action, the whole affair having been settled out of court.

The Clatsop Grand Jury yesterday filed into court and before filing its final report, submitted a not true bill in the matter of the charge of murder preferred against C. Roy Fox in the case of the death of poor Blanche Day; and a true bill against him, in that relation, indicting him for inducing a minor to enter a house of prostitution. After which its report was read, filed and the jury discharged from further service.

The Court then recessed until the hour of 9:30 this morning.
