PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6.—There are rather full supplies of all sorts of semi-tropical fruits, and in the morning's receipts was a car of second-grade bananas, which on account of small size was selling at about 1-2c under customary price.

The fruit trade is surprised at the continued full supplies of apples. The season has been prolonged much beyond the usual time, and the quality of the fruit keeps up amazingly. Orchardists have no reason to complain, for prices are well maintained and the season's profits will undoubtedly show a large increase over former years.

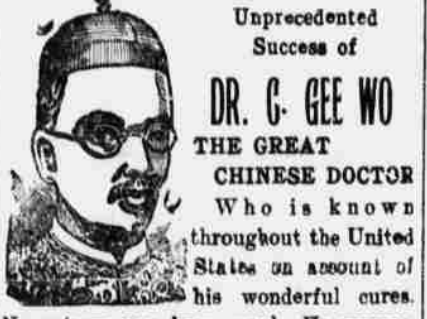

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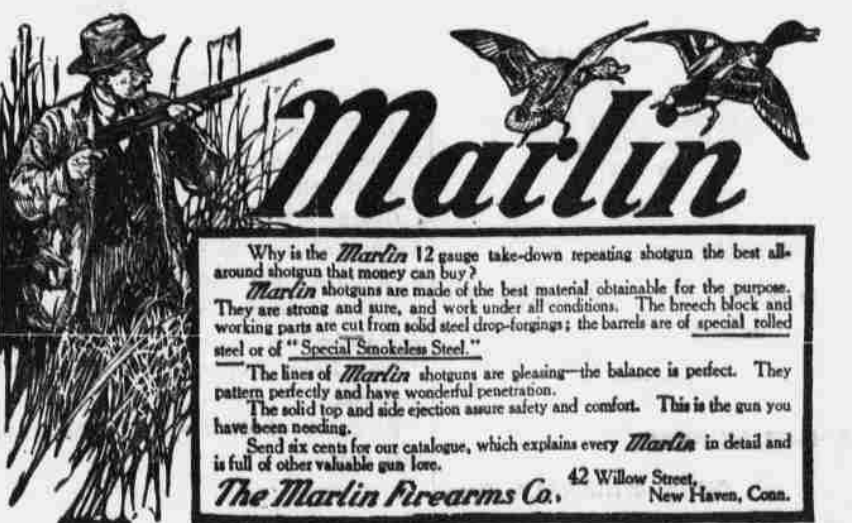
