All Hands Busy—Birch & Jacobson, the contractors, sent a gang of six men over into the Lewis & Clark Country, to move the home of County Commissioner William Larsen about 600 feet to the eastward. They say, they intend to go to the improvement of Eleventh street, between Bond and Commercial, just as soon as the material can be placed on the ground.

Chemicals in Face—Young Barney Sovey came near sacrificing his eyes yesterday morning, at the High School, while carrying out a demonstration in chemistry. He put some chloride of potash and sulphur together in such fashion as to cause the stuff to explode and his eyes were nearly involved seriously. Prompt treatment by Dr. J. A. Logging Camp Injury—D. F. Peterson, a logger employed at the Wisconsin Lumber Company's logging camp near Oak Point, Wash., formerly Benson's Bunker Hill camp, was badly crushed Wednesday, by falling under a logging truck. He was riding on the truck and fell off in front of the wheels. Both legs were severely crushed and one arm injured. He was sent to Astoria by boat, and thence to Portland by rail under care of his brother-in-law. No news has been received of his present condition.

Revoke License—Owing to the report of the grand jury on the Waldorf dance hall, the city fathers may revoke the license of that place. Under the charter amendment, the common council has the right to do this. If the owners of the Waldorf should contest the revocation of the license, they would have to appeal to the Supreme court as to the legality of the amendments, which would be as satisfactory a test of their validity as the Columbia Avenue sewer case, and perhaps cheaper to the city. Meanwhile, the license of the Waldorf would stand revoked.

Serious Accident—Mrs. Margaret Brown, an aged widow residing on Exchange street between Eleventh and Twelfth streets was severely injured as the result of a fall last evening. She lives across the street from the residence property at 513 Exchange street owned by her, on which alterations are being made. Yesterday evening she took a notion to inspect the building and went over to do so. The workmen had removed a section of the walk running around the house and placed an obstruction to bar the way. Mrs. Brown squeezed past the impediment, without seeing the danger and fell off the walk to the ground below, a distance of some fifteen feet or more. Neighbors attracted by her cries came to her assistance, and she was taken home and medical aid summoned. She was found to have a bad scalp wound and may have sustained internal injuries. Her advanced age of eighty-four years makes her hurt the more serious.

FIXING FOR SEASON OF 1907

BOATS AND STEAMERS AND LAUNCHES UNDER CONTRACT AT THE SHIP YARDS OF THE CITY—BUSY TIMES THERE.

Finding things a bit quiet down in the heart of the city yesterday, an Astorian reporter wandered along the waterfront until he got into the livelier section where the boat builders and machine makers are all working over-time trying to catch up with their orders for the coming season.

He found the Astoria Iron Works in full blast on a big general line of boilers and other ordinary phases of its large custom work, and Superintendent Troyer paying particular attention to a fine group of gas engines going together under pressure of time limit orders. He has just completed a splendid 35 horse-power Troyer gas engine for the J. Lindenberg, incorporated, to serve the launch Betty now under a general line of repairs at the R. M. Leathers boat yard. He also showed a fine three-cylinder high speed, 15 horse-power Troyer, for Captain Alec Miller, to be installed in the new and handsome launch Meta M., just being finished at the big shops of John Salm, on West Astor street; this engine is a new type, very light and powerful, and a proven success. Mr. Troyer had a line of six fine 5 horse-power engines of the Troyer pattern on the benches undergoing the finishing touches, for various local boats about the river, mostly of the fishing class. And yesterday his company closed the contract for the construction of one of the 3-cylinder h-p engines referred to, for the new fish-patrol boat, ordered by Fish Commissioner Van Dusen.

Across the street and on the waterfront, the Leathers yards are bristling with work indicating the approach of the new fishing season, and all hands are busy all the time. Mr. Leathers is finishing the repairs on the Lindenberg launch Meta, which, on Saturday next, will be dispatched to southeastern Alaska, under command of Captain Hamilton, with John Bonnovitch in charge of her engines.

He has just completed fifteen fine large fish boats, each of which will carry 1,700 fish, as against the Columbia river boat's 1,000 and 1,200. Of these six are for the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company; ten are billed to the Portland-Alaska Packing Association, and three go to Peter Nelson's salting station on the Kuskukin, in Alaska. There are four yet to finish. Six of them have been delivered, nine go into the water on Saturday and the others will be pressed to completion at once.

He has just closed a contract with L. P. Hunt, of the Shakan Canning Company, at Shakan, Alaska, for a fine 53 foot steamer, which will be equipped with a 35 h-p Union gas engine, and yesterday he closed the deal for the new fish patrol boat for the State, with Warden Van Dusen, allied to elsewhere in this issue.

Mr. Leathers has also a bunch of fish boats on the ways for local delivery and service. The 65 foot steamer belonging to the Pacific Transfer Company, is still on the ways at his yards and Tom Bell, who was in the city yesterday, will have her finished right in the yards here, and send her engines here for installation. Mr. Leathers will proceed with the painting of the vessel at once.

John Salm, the Astor street boat-builder has his yards full of work, the chief item there being the new and fine launch Meta M., for Alec Miller, which is a fine specimen of that particular handiwork. He has a number of big fish boats also underway, for local owners, and can scarcely stop work long enough to talk.

Wilson Brothers yesterday closed a contract for a new 85 foot, twin screw steamer, with William Andrews, of Deep River, and will begin work on her today; and their Smith Point yards are full of minor orders and craft generally.

Besides the Betty, the well known launches Sophie, and the Pilot are undergoing full repairs at the Leathers yards, and the last limit of his orders, on anything and everything he has there, is June the 15th next.

So it will be seen there is no lack of signs of the coming season in that locality.
