PORTLAND Ore., Mar. 7.—Large receipts of eggs continue to come in, and while some of the commission firms report daily clean-ups at recent prices, there are others that were unable to place their surplus stocks yesterday even at the 17c mark.

The market nevertheless shows more steadiness and further drop is not looked for at present. From telegraphic news the Atlantic coast is reported as keeping about a cent higher than Chicago and Kansas City, freight off, but heavy shipments are going west daily from the Middle West. Today eggs were quoted at 16c at Chicago.

FAMOUS FLAG.

Inspired Francis Scott Key to Composition of National Ode.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Mrs. George Livingstone Baker of New Brighton Staten Island, is authority for the statement that the Star Spangled Banner which flew over Fort Michigan during its bombardment in the war of 1812 and inspired Francis Scott Key to the composition of the national ode is now in this city.

Mrs. Baker is the grand daughter of Colonel George Armstrong. The flag, she says, is the property of Eben Appleton, of this city, her brother, and has been deposited by him in the safe deposit vaults of a Broadway Trust Company.

There has been a good deal of inquiry regarding this flag recently, which was reported as lost.

Mrs. Baker said that if her brother has an intention to leave the flag on his death to either one of the National Museums at Washington, or the Massachusetts Historical Museum at Boston.

HOSPITAL AS MEMORIAL.

To the Victims of the Iroquois Fire Disaster.

CHICAGO, March 7.—Simultaneously with the taking of the first testimony in the trial of Will J. Davis, a definite move was made yesterday toward the establishment of an emergency hospital in the down town district as a memorial to the victims of the Iroquois theatre fire.

This came in the formal submission to the Cook County Board of Commissioners, of a plan formulated by the trustees of the Iroquois Memorial Emergency Hospital and first announced yesterday.

The plan contemplates the erection of property to be furnished by the county board of an emergency relief station to be located down town—with in the loop if possible—and to be maintained and operated in connection with

the Cook County Hospital. The building and equipment are to be furnished by the trustees through popular subscription, the only condition of the gift being that the institution shall be named, "Iroquois Memorial Emergency Hospital."

Although no formal action was taken by the county board it is generally understood the commissioners favored the plan.

OATH OF ALLEGIANCE.

TEHERAN, March 7.—The oath of allegiance was administered to the members of the chamber of deputies yesterday. 700 Persians comprising the volunteer corps of the national guard are being drilled each day. It is reported that unrest prevails throughout the country.
