### GETTING IN READINESS.

**Cannery People Making All Initial Preparations For The Alaska Season.**

The Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company of this city, has been warming up the steam tender North Star during the past few days, turning her over, oiling her up and limbering her for the exigencies of the new season in Alaska. They will have the ship John Carrier back here and loading by the 5th of the coming month and will get her away with the northbound fleet by the 15th of April. They will send 110 Americans, 50 Japanese and 60 Chinaman north as usual.

The Warren Packing Company is doing pretty much the same thing up at Goble, with their tender, the North King, and their supply ship, the Berlin and will be on hand in the middle of April with their equipment and people.

The Columbia River Packers' Association has the ship St. Nicholas here and will have her in perfect readiness, and duly equipped for the far north, with the usual big group of workers, headed by Superintendent L. O. Belland.

Superintendent Berglund goes out with the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company's outfit and Superintendent Daley will again have charge of the Warren outfit.

### ANOTHER GOOD SIGN.

**R. E. Carruthers to Superintend Construction of New Hotel.**

The pleasant news is about the city, and verified at that, just as soon as the Weinhard Estate shall be in readiness to close the contract for its fine, twentieth-century hotel, in this city, R. E. Carruthers will take immediate charge of the work of laying the heavy cement, 100-foot square foundations upon which the fine pile is to be surmounted.

This intelligence is conclusive of the purpose of this group of capitalists to proceed with the venture, as well as indicative of their good judgment in providing for really excellent work in the most important phase of the project. The Astorian joins all others in congratulations and in the hope that nothing will hinder the consummation of this, the most crying need of the city.

### SIGNS WARRANTS.

**Mayor Wise, However, Has Not Yet Signed Oil Ordinance.**

Mayor Herman Wise yesterday signed all the warrants ordered drawn at the last meeting of the common council. He has signed all the ordinances passed except the oil tank ordinance, which requires all persons erecting oil tanks of over 5,000 gallons capacity to surround such tank with a retaining wall or reinforced cement, four feet high at the highest point of ground, along the boundary line of the property according to a certain plan, and to fill the street before their property to certain limits. This measure the Mayor has taken under advisement.

### ILL AT HOSPITAL.

**Adolph Anderson is Seized By Spinal Meningitis.**

Adolph Anderson a Swedish laborer employed at the power station of the Astoria Electrical Company, was seized with a severe attack of spinal meningitis Wednesday noon. He was taken to St. Mary's hospital for medical treatment yesterday and is reported to be in a very dangerous condition. The high percentage of fatalities in this disease and the acuteness of the attack make his recovery a matter of doubt.

### WILL TAKE VACATION.

**Rev. Seymour Short Leaves Work Temporarily Because of Health.**

Rev. Wm. Seymour Short rector of Grace Episcopal church, has been ill with bronchial trouble for some time and has been compelled to ask for a leave of absence from his church, which has been granted. At the present time he is about without the use of his voice. Another clergyman will attend to Mr. Short's duties until the latter's return.

### VISITS BROTHER.

**Charles Tee of Australia Staying With City Surveyor.**

Charles Tee a mining expert of Australia, is in the city visiting with his brother, A. S. Tee the city surveyor. He will accompany the latter, for Warrenton on private business today. The natural resources of this country have interested the visitor and he may stay in the city for some time to come.

### THE PRESIDENT'S COUP.

**How An Astorian Secured Some Good Help At His House.**

The president of a logging company hereabout met the manager the other day and informed him of his difficulty he was having in securing domestic help at his residence; that he had scoured the States of Washington & Oregon without success and had offered free transportation from the east to any girl that would come to Oregon and cook for his family at the rate of \$30.00 or \$35.00 per month.

The manager of the company, seeing the urgent needs of the president, informed him of trouble having arisen in the camp which would cause the girl lately employed there. Whereupon the president wished to take no chance and lose such an opportunity of securing valuable help, instructed the manager to at once order out all necessary help and appliances to bring the said young lady to town forthwith.

The bookkeeper gave the information that the fallers had already received instructions over the new phone to the camp. The swamper were then ordered to clear the road; the rigging rustlers were put to work, and were followed up by the hook tender who had orders to see the best pair of grabs that could be found in the camp, or if in his judgment, one or two chokers were necessary, to use that appliance, to hook her onto the main line and see that the signal boy made no mistake in his signals, which would cause the trip to foul and in an\* way upset matters during the operation.

### PERJURER IS PARDONED.

**Governor Chamberlain Exercises Clemency Toward Josiah S. Smith.**

Word was received in this city yesterday from Salem that Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain had pardoned Josiah S. Smith, the perjurer, sent up from this county some three years ago, under a sentence of ten years. The basis of the pardon was not given in the letter bringing the news, but it was probably ample to satisfy the governor.

Smith was the chief witness for the infamous Bock, who sued the city of Astoria for alleged personal injuries sustained in a faulty street and sidewalk, receiving quite a handsome judgment, before it was ascertained that he and his principal, Bock, were a notorious pair of professional swindlers along this line, and had mulcted a number of cities out of various sums in this way.

### IN NEAR-BY FIELDS.

**Mr. Lytle's Engineers Doing Surveying Stunts Close In By Astoria.**

The Lytle forces are in the home-field here, and are evidently getting at their points of departure on the old Reid and Gos surveys in this county.

One party was seen yesterday coming up the old right-of-way east of Gearhart and taking observations all along that route, while another is doing some check-work along the Lewis & Clark, with the common purpose of verifying the old lines long since run through that section, and it is said they will unite further south upon the connecting lines that shall forecast the route of the Lytle road into this city, from the Nehalem.
