Steamship Quito Arrives Down Will Be Surveyed.

ROANOKE IS DUE IN TODAY

Columbia Sails Tomorrow Morning Early—Wages Advanced in Light-house Fleet—Arabia Down, China Bound—Aurelia Ang Northland In.

Captain Barry Enkins brought the British steamship Quito, laden with general cargo for the Orient, down from Portland and her enforced detention of two days at Martin's Island, down yesterday afternoon, and she came to an anchorage off the O. R. & N. piers here. It is not thought she is seriously injured by her stranding up the river, but will be duly surveyed under the authority of Mr. Cherry, the British vice consul at this port and will then proceed to China.

In the fleets of the Thirteenth light-Orders were received yesterday from Washington directing the payment of a monthly wage of \$50., to the sailors house district, and Commander Werlich has passed the order here, so there should be no further difficulty in securing mariners for the Armeria, bound for the Sound; the Columbine headed for the Alaskan coast, and the Heather billed for a trip to the Coos Bay neighborhood.

The steamship Columbia is due down from Portland at 3 o'clock on Saturday morning, (tomorrow), and will leave out for San Francisco at 6 o'clock sharp. She is carrying heavily lately, owing to the disrupted condition of the rail line to the south.

The steamship Arabia arrived down yesterday afternoon en route to Hong Kong and other Oriental ports, and will leave out on the early tide this morning.

The steamship Roanoke is due in from the California coast sometime today, and it is said she has an immense business awaiting her in Portland and here.

The steamer Northland arrived in from the Bay City yesterday afternoon and went directly on to the metropolis with Captain Al. Betts on the bridge.

The steamer Aurelia entered port yesterday afternoon and docked at the Callender pier for a while, going on to the metropolis later in the evening.

The schooner Americana is on her way to this port from Portland, lumber laden for San Pedro, and will probably sail hence today sometime.

The steamer Washington came down yesterday morning early and went to sea and San Francisco at once.

The Oklaama is due down this morning with the schooner Alvina, lumber laden for San Pedro.

The steamer Santa Ana is due down from Portland this morning on her way to San Francisco.

IN THE UPPER COURT

Jury Completed in the Case of State Vs. Forest.

PRESENTATION OF EVIDENCE

Testimony Of Eight Witnesses For State Taken Yesterday—Two To Come Today—Defense Based On Theory Of Accidental Shooting.

The second day of the adjourned session of the Circuit court opened at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning with Judge McBride on the bench and the court officers and bar in attendance and all making ready for the event of the term, the trial of Captain Charles M. Forest, upon the charge of murder.

The new venire of twelve jurors was in court, and after being duly sworn to service, the work of securing the four needed jurors in the Forest case was taken up and the following citizens were selected in that behalf:

Messrs: W. E. Cole, O. Paulson, C. Ryerson and P. E. Peterson. This filled the jury bank and the opening statement of the case was made by District Attorney G. P. Hedges and G. C. Fulton; whereupon, the examination of witnesses ensued in order.

The case of the state rests upon the testimony of about ten direct witnesses, eight of whom were examined yesterday, the other two being held until this morning. The eight testifying yesterday were Dr. J. A. Fulton, Chief of Police Charles Gammal, Coroner W. C. A. Pohl, Chief Mate, Martin Peterson, of the schooner Anne Larsen, Mathias Littere, a sailor on the Larsen, Gus Gamble, tallyman for the Astoria Box Company; Paul Penfrat and Jacob Petersen, longshoremen engaged in loading the vessel at the time of the tragedy.

The testimony, aside from the official and professional evidence given by Dr. Fulton and Chief Gammal and Coroner Pohl, was very direct and adhered closely to the facts heretofore published in these columns at the time of the unhappy event and since, and which are generally known to the public of this city; covering the main facts of the time, place and character of the engagement; the friction between the master and the man; the blows that passed; the departure of the man Geo. Fisher from the schooner's deck to the dock alongside; the going to the cabin by the captain; of his return to the quarter deck, armed, and of his firing at Fisher through the port mizen rigging, of the wounds inflicted and of Fisher's subsequent death from the same. There was but little if any variation in the testimony yielded yesterday and that given before Coroner Pohl at the inquest last December. The state will probably close its presentation of the case this morning, and will be followed by the introduction of defensive testimony which, it is now believed will be along the line of accidental shooting.

The court room was crowded to suffocation yesterday and Judge McBride deemed it expedient to call the attention of the crowd to the weakness of the old structure and advise against a too great congestion of people at the southerly end of the room, so that if anything happened is should not occur without warning. Many shifted their location in the room at this suggestion and others departed rather than face such a contingency; the announcement was altogether timely and will probably result in more care being used. There was deep interest manifested throughout the trial yesterday and this will increase with today's unfoldment of the story of the defense, which, in the hands of Senator Fulton and his able brother, will be intensely interesting. There is wide and manifest sympathy for the aged captain and for his wife and son munity is plainly apparent all through who are with him every moment of the time and the interest of the com-yesterday's proceedings.

All jurors not engaged on the case at bar, were excused from further service at the present term of the court, and went their several ways.

The only other matter reaching the attention of the court yesterday was the case of Lizzie Takala versus Matt Takala, for divorce, went to the record on an order of default and granting the separation prayed for.

Adjournment was taken until 9:30 o'clock this morning.
