NASEL TO BE IMPROVED.

Weyerhaeuser Timber Syndicate Will Improve the Work.

Two representatives of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Syndicate were expected to arrive in this city last night from Tacoma, and from here they will go to the Nasel River in Pacific county, Wash., where they will start the preliminary work of improving that stream for logging purposes, they having recently been granted the booming privileges. The work will consist of a big dam besides several lesser ones and all the snags, etc., will be removed making it a model stream for logging. The cost will be approximately \$50,000. Messrs.
