Yesterday on the Waterfront of Old Astoria.

BAR BOUND FLEET BREAKS

Roanoke Gets Away For California—Kilburn Arrives Four Days Behind—Chehalis In—Manila Down—Odd Items of News.

When the sun arose yesterday morning in his glory for the first time in quite a bunch of days. It was to brighten the way out for quite a bar bound fleet of vessels in the lower harbor. But the fleet dissolved under his warm and radiant smile like a pan of milk under the practised tongue of the kitchen cat, the following vessels taking flight to sea and their several destinations: The steamships Quito, Ardmount, Fuqui Maru, Skogstad, and Arabia, and the French bark Jacques, on the lines of the Tatoosh, the only ones remaining being the French bark Emily Galline and the Russian ship Fennia, which will probably go out this morning.

Captain Bonser, a well known river steamer master on all the important streams of the northwest and who has

many friends in Astoria where he worked years ago, is in the city with orders to take the steamer Northwest around to Vancouver, B. C., and will leave out just as soon as the old Pacific has calmed down sufficiently to allow his flat-bottomed charge a chance to make the passage.

One of the best signs on the face of things at Astoria, just new is the great gathering of fishing boats that have been released from their winter "snug-harbors," cleared and furnished up, motors, oars and sails, and now swarming at all the docks and slips in the city, daily. About 3,300 of them will be in actual service next week.

The barkentine Chehalis arrived in yesterday afternoon and will go on to Stella for a load of ties, on the first tow that offers.

The schooner Sehome was among the arrivals in this port yesterday and will go on up the river on the Oklahoma this morning.

The steamer Cascades came down the river yesterday morning and went to sea and San Francisco without much delay.

The steamship Roanoke left the Callender docks at 7 o'clock yesterday morning bound for the coast of California.

The light-house tender Heather is due in from her trip to the south, and will probably be at her pier this morning.

DELICATE SURGERY AT ST. MARYS

TWO OF THE MOST DELICATE OPERATIONS WERE RECENTLY PERFORMED AT ST. MARYS HOSPITAL.

Two of the most remarkable operations in the history of St. Mary's hospital have been performed within the last week. In both instances Dr. Toivo Forstrom was the operating surgeon.

The case of Elick Fraser, of Olney, afflicted with cataracts in both eyes was operated on a week ago Wednesday. At that time a portion of each eye was removed, and the patient placed in a darkened room, securely bandaged. Yesterday morning the bandages were removed and for the first time in three years Mr. Fraser could see. He will be able to leave the hospital by Saturday. The operation is entirely successful and is the first of its kind at St. Mary's.

The other is the instance of a son of Hendrick Helonen. Typhoid fever left the tendons on one leg in a contracted condition at the kneecap. The limb was crooked and unable to support the weight of the body, the patient moving about on crutches. To straighten the leg out would have resulted in gangrene. The surgeon removed sections of the bone above and below the knee and as a result the leg knit the patient will be able to walk with out the aid of crutches. The knee will of course be stiff and the discrepancy in length will have to be overcome by adding extra lifts to the shoe on that foot but it is infinitely better than locomotion with the aid of crutches. The leg was encased in plaster bandages and Helonen it is expected will leave the hospital in two or three months.

1906 SALMON PRICES RE-ADOPTED

COLUMBIA RIVER PACKERS DECIDE TO PAY LAST YEARS MONEY FOR THE 1907 CATCH, OWING TO ADVANCES IN COSTS.

The Astorian learns from indubitable sources, that the majority, in fact, practically all, of the Columbia river canneries, have all concluded to pay the 1904 prices for salmon for the catch of this season and passed the word to their fishermen, yesterday, to this effect.

This is one-half cent lower than the figures adopted at the recent session of the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Association and is adopted in view of the fact that it will only yield the same measure of profit to the packers realized last year, owing to the universal raise in the current values of all materials and supplies incident to the business.

It was not possible last evening to ascertain the reception of this news in the big association of fishermen, but it will probably develop today sometime, and it is hoped, will be confirmed.

The decision reached yesterday by the canners was based absolutely upon the most careful adjustments of the markets and the possible demands and including the advanced sale of prices confronting them in the purchase of all manner of cannery and boat supplies, and from no motive antagonistic to the fishermen, in any sense, or direction.
