BUSINESS WOUND UP YESTERDAY

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' COURT CLEANS UP ITS APRIL CALENDAR AND ADJOURNS UNTIL MAY TERM.

The county commissioners met in adjourned session yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock, with Judge C. J. Tronchard, presiding, and Commissioners William Larson and John Frye flanking him on the bench, and County Clerk J. C. Clinton, in attendance with the records of the court. The court wound out its deferred business matters, in the following order:

Dr. J. A. Fulton presented his resignation as County Health Officer, and the same was accepted by the court, which immediately proceeded to nominate and elect his successor, the two candidates named being Drs. Pilkington and Mohn, the result of the ballot falling to Dr. Mohn. The salary is merely \$10 per month.

The court then took up the matter of the application of the W. W. Johnson Lumbering Company, for permission to cross the county roads with a logging railway; and the petition was granted and the bond filed in that behalf, was approved.

It was ordered by the court that the clerk draw and forward to the state department at Salem, a warrant covering the first half of the state tax, on the 1906 tax roll, and another, covering the whole of the Agricultural College tax, due from this county.

The claim for damages alleged to have been sustained by Patrick Kin-

ney by reason of the crossing of the Svensen logging railway across the county road near his home farm, was ceived and considered, and the clerk was directed to present the same to the Svensen company at once, and request an answer by Wednesday, May 1st. The clerk was also ordered to communicate this action to Mr. Kinney.

The matter of the claim of Elsie Elmora La Force, for cancellation of certain tax wrongfully levied against her property, was read and considered by the court and allowed.

In the case of the claims of Mr. Davison, in the matter of the construction of a small county bridge over a stream near the county line of Tillamook, was taken up, considered, and allowed in the sum of \$5.00.

The court then adjourned until the first Wednesday in May, which, this time comes on the first day of the month.
