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ORGANIZING TRUSTEES.

Booker T. Washington Preparing To Care For Endowment Fund.

NEW YORK, April 25.—Booker T. Washington, president of the Tuskegee Institute, Alabama, and Hollis Burke Frissell, president of Hampton Institute, Virginia, are here to organize a board of trustees to handle the endowment fund of \$1,000,000 given by Miss Anna Jeanes, of Germantown, Pennsylvania, for the assistance and maintenance of schools for southern negroes. Dr. Washington says that the board will consist principally of southern men, some white and some colored and that great care was being taken to pick men well qualified for the trust.

DENNIS KEARNEY DEAD.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—Dennis Kearney, who in the late 70s headed the Sand Lot agitation against the Chinese in this state, died last night at his home in Alameda. He at one time had a large following in this city, the political affairs of which he dominated for a period. Of late years he has not taken any active part in politics.

Following is the official record of the proceedings had at the regular April term, 1907, of the county commissioners court for Clatsop County, Oregon; the detail being furnished from the office of County Clerk J. C. Clinton:

In the matter of the road petitioned for by William Hartill and others in road district No. 4. Ordered that J. F. Bartoldus, county road master, George Stevens, surveyor, and W. E. Cole, viewer, constitute the board of road viewers. That they meet at Lewis & Clark Bridge No. 1, on Wednesday, April 17 and proceed to view and lay-out said road.

Liquor license granted Fred Olson to sell wine, malt and vinuous liquors in Olney precinct for a period of one year.

The following bids were opened for hauling lumber from the D. L. Kelly Lumber Company mill at Warrenton and distributing same along the road running to the Lewis & Clark bridge. John Larson, \$1.25 per thousand feet; August Jurhs, 95 cents per thousand feet; W. C. Hardie, \$1.20 per thousand feet. Contract awarded to August Jurhs.

In the matter of improving County Road No. 104:

The following bids were opened for improving county road, beginning in Warrenton Park and running to a stake in the county road known as the Adair Road. August Jurhs, clearing

16 feet wide through center and grading hill, \$173, without grading hill, \$158; August Jurhs, clearing 16 feet wide on one side of center of road and grading hill, \$124, without grading hill, \$109; William Billingslea, clearing and putting in shape for planking, \$300; Ansel Braley, clearing road ready for planking \$275. Contract awarded to August Jurhs for the sum of \$173, to clear 16 feet wide through center and grade hill. Bond fixed at \$100.

The following bids were opened for improving county road No. 77, near Vesper, as per notice. William Jones, commencing 28 rods northeast of 37-mile post or at beginning of change, thence 180 rods southeast to the old road at which place the supervisor set a second stake, being all of the new change from the George Hiseal ranch to the Charles Anderson place, at \$2.40 per rod. Contract awarded to William Jones and his bond fixed at \$200.

Upon a petition having been presented to the Court, the Suomalainen Co-operative Company is directed to deliver to Mrs. Joseph Nyman, provisions to the amount of \$8 per month, until the further order of the court.

Liquor license granted to Anton Kulljus to sell wine, malt and spirituous liquors in Clifton Precinct No. 1, for a period of one year.

Ordered that the road master secure the services of Andrew Johnson and proceed to re-build the draw bridge across the Little Walluski river, said bridge being unsafe for travel.

Report of road master for March, read and ordered filed.

Town plat of Harriman, as laid out, dedicated and platted by Laura P. Barker, approved.

Ordered that the clerk ask for bids for improving the county road between Warrenton and Flavel. Bids to be filed on or before April 16, 1907.

Ordered that the clerk write G. W. Warren, asking him to present to the court, his proposition, in writing, for the planking of the road between Warrenton and Flavel. The part in question being where said road crosses the railroad track, near his gate, and running to a small bridge.

Liquor license granted to D. Falangus to sell wine, malt and spirituous liquors in Clifton precinct for a period of six months.

In the matter of the road petitioned for by Otto Johansen and others. Report of viewers read second time and road ordered opened.

In the matter of the road petitioned for by Louis Myllenbeck and others. Report of viewers read second time and same ordered opened.

Ordered that the clerk ask for bids for improving Nehalem Road No. 77. Beginning at a point where the new survey intersects the old road near the 16-mile post and continuing along the route surveyed to near the bridge across the north fork of the Klaskanine at Kamm's farm. Bids to state the price per mile. Bids to be filed on or before May 1, 1907.

The county surveyor is instructed to examine different routes from the city water works power house to the Travelers' Rest, and file a report showing the most feasible route for a permanent road.

In the matter of the Port of Columbia Bill:

It appearing to the Court that some of our citizens are of the opinion that the Court is not proceeding with the test of said law, the Court desires to state that the attorneys heretofore appointed to examine and report to the Court, have so far failed to do so, but stated to the court it was on account of other business preventing. The Court is fully alive to the matter and ready at any time to intervene and will take the proper steps to protect Clatsop County.

In the matter of the Elk Creek road: The County Court having heretofore spent a considerable sum of money on this road. And deeming this road one of the important highways of the county. Would at this time call the attention of those interested in the said road. For several reasons. First, that the cost of completing said road will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000. Second, that the Court is not in a position this year (on account of building the Court House), to expend such a sum on any one road. But the Court does feel that if an effort was made on the part of the property owners, the Court would assist in putting the road through as soon as possible. The importance of our summer resorts is plainly recognized by the railroads. Contract awarded to A. W. Duncan for improving the Elk Creek road as follows: Beginning at the improved road near the Russian Cabin and connecting with the old road at White's



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Bottom. The price to be \$1500. The improvement to be completed by August 1, 1907. The contractor to file a bond in the sum of \$500.

Ordered that the time for receiving bids for improving the county road between Warrenton and Flavel, be Dr. F. V. Mohn, appointed health officer, vice Dr. J. A. Fulton, resigned, extended to May 1.

The W. W. Johnson Lumber Company, granted permission to cross a county road in the northeast quarter of section 1, township 7 north, range 6 west.

Patrick Kenney having filed a claim of \$165 for damages caused by the crossing of the Sorrenson Logging Company, across a county road. Ordered that the clerk send a copy of the claim to the Sorrenson Logging Company requesting an answer regarding the matter.

Mr. August Davidson allowed the sum of \$5 for rebuilding a small bridge near the Tillamook County Line.

It appearing to the Court that the

following amounts are due the State of Oregon from Clatsop County for the year 1907:

And it further appearing that one-half of the amount should be paid before the first day of May, 1907. It is ordered that the clerk be authorized to draw a warrant or warrants to pay one-half of the state tax amounting to \$10,890 and the full amount of the State Agricultural College tax amount to \$580.

Ordered that Court do adjourn for the term.
