## RIVER, BAY AND BAR

Tottenham and Strathclyde Due in Today.

ARMERIA HOME FROM SOUND

Chehalis Leaves Out—Elder Enters From California—Northland in From San Francisco—Annie Larsen Returns—Melrose Here.

The British bark Zinita, 197 days out from Antwerp, Captain Swan, in command, came to an anchor in the lower harbor of this port yesterday a little after 4 o'clock. This is the ship that has awakened a bit of uneasiness in the marine world of late owing to her unusually long passage. Captain Swan reports a long siege of adverse winds in both oceans; and among the elements of delay was the necessity of putting into Bahia, Brazil, with part of his crew in an almost mutinous condition, four of them being in the lead and many of them cowed into submission by the malcontents and contributing against their will, to the disorder and trouble. The four worst were turned over to the proper authorities and others shipped out in their stead, and the voyage continued with only contrary winds to lengthen it out. The vessel is laden with cement and part general cargo and is consigned to Meyer Wilson & Company, at Portland, and she will go up river on the first tow that offers. All well on board. The Zinita is well known in these northern waters, as she was once on the Washington coast at a point between Shoal Water Bay and Gray's Harbor for ten days and was safely hauled back to her proper element. This happened about five years ago, and she has made another trip to the coast since that. She is among the rare examples of ships that go ashore and get off again without serious damage, and is good for many another.

The fine lighthouse tender Armeria came in from her first official cruise on Sunday noon last. She has been making the round of the light stations on Puget Sound. Captain Gregory declares he is very much pleased with her and that she is going to be an immensely serviceable boat on this district. She makes fine time, is easily handled and as comfortable as a passenger liner. And he is the man who can discover the good and bad points of a ship about as quickly and thoroughly as any master afloat.

The Astoria tug Lottie is on the ways at Portland. She went on for some minor repairs and it was found that nearly all her stern was rotting away and the scope of work on her will be much enhanced in order to make her safe and serviceable.

The British steamship Strathclyde left San Francisco for this port yesterday, and is due in at the Tongue Point mills tomorrow evening for a partial load of lumber, finishing at Portland, all for Oriental delivery.

A formal bill of sale was filed at the Custom House yesterday showing the sale and purchase of the schooner Evie, by the Arctic Trading & Transportation Company to Samuel Elmore of this city. The consideration named is \$10.

The Columbia fleet of day steamers out of Portland all leave the metropolis at a given hour each morning, and yesterday the gang got away on good time with the Telegraph in the lead, the Spencer following, then the Telephone, and finally the Lurline. They all raced down the Willamette to the Columbia, and it is said that it was one of the prettiest sights of the season to see the Telephone pick up the Spencer and the Telegraph, and gracefully drip them to the rear, beating the whole bunch down the Columbia by half a mile. Frank Warren was on the Telegraph and had a good view of the whole business, but he didn't tell this story. It is admitted now that the Telephone has no rival on either river, and holds the Northwest pennant.

Nick Day entered the Kamm service yesterday as freight clerk on the steamer Lurline, vice Jack Moran, resigned. Jack is going to farming, mostly under the "shade of the old apple tree," and expects to get into the habit of sleeping once more. With all good wishes for Mr. Day, there are lots of people who will miss Jack Moran from the old time run.

The German bark Tellus was among the fleet to enter this port yesterday and is at anchor in the lower bay. Captain Prohn is in command. The Tellus is out from Shields, England, and is cement laden and consigned to W. P. Fuller & Co., at Portland. She left out of England on the 3d of last December.

Today's trip is the last that will be made by Captain Kane Olney, of the steamer Lurline, as he intends to resign and retire to his ten-acre farm in the suburbs of Portland. He'll stay away from the river just long enough to get rested up and then he will be back and busy.

The steamer Geo. W. Elder entered port yesterday morning on the early flood and went on to the metropolis after a brief stay at the Callender pier. She will return down tomorrow morning, outward bound.

The famous schooner Annie Larsen came in from the Bay City yesterday afternoon and will haul in to the Astoria Box Company's dock for a load of lumber for San Francisco delivery.

The steamship Costa Rica was among the Sunday arrivals, going on to the metropolis at once. She will return down for the Bay City on Wednesday afternoon next, tomorrow.

The barkentine J. M. Griffith sailed in over the bar yesterday, coming up from San Francisco in 13 days. She is after another big load of lumber.

The fine schooner Mabel Gale will finish loading lumber at the Simpson mills at Knappton tomorrow and will leave out for San Francisco at once.

The oil steamer Whittier arrived in yesterday evening and went directly on to Portland under the pilotage of Captain Tom Crang.

The steamer Alliance will be down en route to Coos Bay, tomorrow morning and will leave out from the Callender pier as usual.

The steamer Excelsior came down the river on Sunday last and went to sea with her big load of lumber, San Francisco bound.

The Johan Poulsen is due in at the Knappton mills tomorrow, to load lumber for the return trip to the Bay City.

The schooner Sallor Boy came in from sea and San Francisco yesterday afternoon under her own canvas, and will load lumber outward.

The four-masted schooner Melrose sailed in over the Columbia bar yesterday afternoon and dropped anchors in the city channel.

The American ship Eclipse entered port yesterday from San Pedro, and at anchor in the lower harbor. She comes after lumber.

The steamer Northland arrived in from San Francisco yesterday and went on up the river after another big load of lumber.

The oil steamer Maverick came down the river on Sunday last and went to sea and San Francisco without delay.

The steamer Nome City was among the arrivals from the South on Sunday last, going on to Portland at once.

The barkentine Chehalis went to sea and San Francisco yesterday with her big load of railway ties.

The British steamship Tottenham from Victoria is due in this port this morning.
