#### Died At Hospital—

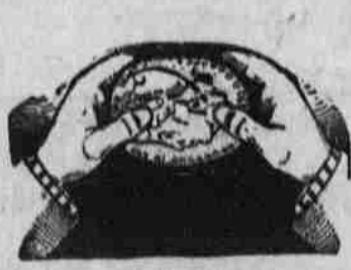
