MONEY FOR DEEP SEA FISHING

J. M. ALEXANDER MAY LOCATE SUCH AN ENTERPRISE HERE—WOULD BE A BIG THING FOR ASTORIA.

J. M. Alexander, of Aberdeen, Wash., who has been in the city for the past few days on business in connection with his fishing enterprises on Gray's Harbor, was a caller at the headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon.

He is deeply interested in the deep sea fishing and while here has been looking up the matter of establishing such an enterprise here in the near future.

Mr. Alexander has had an extended experience in deep sea fishing in both this country and Europe and believes that no better place for a location for such an enterprise can be found anywhere in America than in Astoria.

While in Astoria he looked over all the available sites for the location of his fishery but so far has not decided on any particular spot. Should anyone have a location suitable for such an enterprise of 200 to 250 in width they might do well to communicate all details concerning the same to Manager John H. Whyte of the Chamber of Commerce who will negotiate with Mr. Alexander.

"The deep sea fishing industry of Puget Sound," said Mr. Alexander, "with which I am very familiar, was last year worth just \$6,000,000 to the commerce of the State of Washington. The total fishing business of the Sound amounted to \$10,460,000, which shows that so far as that locality is concerned, the deep sea fishing business is worth far more than all the others put together. And as great as is the value of the salmon fishing industry of Astoria at this time, and as great as it always has been, I believe that the deep sea fishing business can be developed and made more valuable than the salmon fishing ever has been or ever can be.

"It seems to me that the people of Astoria do not fully realize all of the good things that they have all about them in the way of natural resources. I believe I can say without egotism that no one knows more of the 'ins and outs' of deep sea fishing than I do and that if I could but secure a suitable location here at what I consider a proper figure, I would not hesitate to locate here at once. I know that there are other industries going to locate here right away and that in a short time it will possibly be difficult to find room for all of them, but none will prove of more value than the deep sea fishing. Of this I am sure and certain as I ever have been of anything in all my life.

"Now as to a site for my proposed Astoria deep sea fishing plant. I have found that the prices of waterfront property here is held at what I consider a very high price. And it seems to me that the location of new industries and enterprises might be more encouraged if sites were offered at more reasonable figures. And indeed in the case of an enterprise like mine it would doubtless be of greater benefit to the city than it would to me, should the citizens here through their Chamber of Commerce or otherwise make it especially easy for me to secure a permanent location. Should they see fit to do this I will promise to give them one of the largest business enterprises within the next few years that can be found anywhere in the northwest.

"This is only a suggestion thrown out but it might be well if your citizens would give it careful consideration and then their approval."
