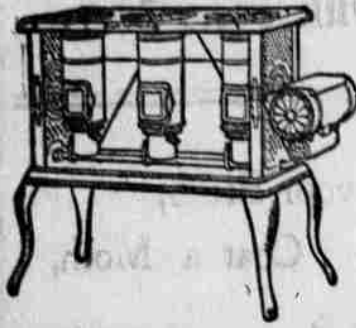

It is hoped that the members will not forget that the Chamber is a clearing-house for all ideas of importance that have a bearing upon public matters," said Manager Whyte, "and if a member has an idea that he believes will better the city or assist in its growth if it were worked out it is his duty to communicate same to the Chamber and explain how he thinks it can best be worked out in order that the work may immediately begin. This suggestion will always be an important one and should be borne in mind at all times.

"We would like to have the members bear in mind that we are anxious to locate as soon as possible all dairy and farm land that is for sale around Astoria. If they know of any such land we would like to have owners call at the Chamber and give details,

and we have been thinking of the advisability of advertising in the local papers for owners of such land."

A letter was read from G. R. Haines, of Chicago, who desires to establish a piano factory here, a duplicate of the one now in Chicago, which cost \$65,000, and asks this city to donate \$50,000, or grounds or a site that would make up for it. The communication was referred to the manager and committee on manufacturing and industries.

A letter was received from J. C. Clifton, county clerk, showing that the State Board of Agriculture has been requesting exhibits for the State Fair. The communication was referred to Manager Whyte, Judge Bowby and O. I. Peterson for immediate action.

The Chamber received a letter from Mr. H. C. Riser, acting director of the United States Geological Survey, Washington, D. C., in which he says that a survey of certain parts of Oregon is now in progress by the United States Geological Survey and encloses a map showing the state of this progress which is as rapid as the funds of the survey distributed throughout the United States will permit. The rate of progress could be accelerated if this state would make an appropriation for that purpose. The State of Oregon is already co-operating with the survey in topographic work but not in geological. The following resolution was passed concerning this matter:

"Resolved, by the Chamber of Commerce of Astoria, Oregon, that the Director of the Geological Survey be and he is hereby respectfully but earnestly requested to cause to be made a thorough survey of such portions of the State of Oregon as have not been surveyed by his department, for the purpose of locating and classifying the mineral resources of this state, including coal and oil lands."

Mr. R. H. Jenkins, general freight and passenger agent of the A. & C. R., is co-operating with the Chamber in a manner which promises to be beneficial to the city. The Chamber has taken up with him the matter of securing excursion rates to Astoria at the time of the vice-president's visit. Mr. Jenkins will discuss this matter fully with the Chamber in a few days. He is also preparing a list of rates in effect from various points which may be used in literature sent out to be read by the delegates to the Seattle and Spokane conventions in July. These rates will show just how much it will cost to come to Astoria. The matter of securing a new schedule of passenger rates over the A. & C. R. so that if possible no more than 3 cents per mile will be charged for local fares, has been taken up with Mr. Jenkins and he is giving same full consideration.

The Meyers Pump & Manufacturing Company, Kansas City, has presented the Chamber a proposition to establish a \$50,000 plant here for the manufacture of automatic pumping machinery and a new hydraulic air compressor. They will furnish \$20,000 of the money and desire \$20,000 local stock subscription. This proposition was referred to Manager Whyte and the committee on manufacturing and industries.

Mr. J. T. Wallace has been chosen assistant to the manager and began his duties on May 1st. From this time on he will also collect the subscriptions and dues and members are requested to expedite and accelerate his collections as much as possible. Checks may be mailed to the Chamber and, whenever a member can pay the first six months or the whole year, the Chamber will be greatly favored thereby as we will thus have more time for more important things. Already a number of the members have paid a year's subscription in full.

Manager Whyte announced that tests were being made of the clay of Clatsop county and requested that any man anywhere in the county who had what he believed was exceptional clay, immediately send 25 pounds of it to the Chamber. A number of names of those who could furnish such clay was given by the members present.

It was announced again that Dr. David T. Day of the United States Geological Survey at Washington would be present in Astoria sometime this month and address the Chamber on "Black Sands." Full announcement will be made as soon as the exact date of the lecture is set.
