OF INTEREST TO WARRENTONIAN

BID OF \$900 FOR THE ERECTION OF CITY JAIL BY FERGUSON & HOUSTON OF ASTORIA IS ACCEPTED—OTHER LOCAL ITEMS.

WARRENTON, Or., May 7.—The regular meeting of the city council was held last evening at C. F. Lester's residence. Those present were Mayor Lester, Councilmen George W. Warren, Robert J. Abbott, J. Bosshart and William Hagmann, City Auditor and Police Judge Stanton and City Attorney Eakin of Astoria. Bids for the erection of the proposed city jail were presented. Ferguson & Houston, of Astoria, offered to do the work for \$900 and Mr. Jacobs, of Astoria, sent in a bid of \$1270. A motion was made and unanimously carried that Ferguson & Houston's bid of \$900 be accepted. On motion, it was agreed that a sidewalk be built from the west side of Main street to the east side of Hemlock street on the south side of Second street at the expense of the property holders within the area above stated. Orders were made in the regular form on the city treasury for the payment of the following bills: Two months' salary to the city auditor and police judge, \$20; \$5 to Mr. B. Van Dusen, insurance agent, for furnishing the bond of the city auditor, and \$5 cost of advertising for bids for the building of a city jail.

SANTA FE FLYER DITCHED.

Six Hours Late and Running at High Rate of Speed.

HOLLY, Colo., May 7.—Train No. 8 running as second No. 4 California limited on the Santa Fe, was ditched one mile west of Medway, a small block signal station 12 miles east of Holly, last night, the cause being spreading rails. All of the coaches except the last Pullman turned over. The porter and baggage man were hurt, the latter having his right leg broken and a severe gash inflicted in his side. An east-bound local brought back the passengers of the wrecked train to Holly for supper and lodging. A wrecking train was sent from La Junta to assist in clearing the track.

WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS.

Albert Patrick Contemplating Move On Ground of Trickery.

NEW YORK, May 7.—The American today states that Albert T. Patrick, now serving a life sentence for the murder of Millionaire William Rice in 1900 is contemplating asking for a writ of habeas corpus on the ground that he was tricked into with drawing his application for an appeal to the United States Supreme Court while he was under death sentence and accepting commutation to life imprisonment from the late Governor Higgins. The announcement is made on the authority of Mrs. Albert Patrick, wife of the prisoner, given in a long signed statement which the American publishes. In this statement there are charges that the court, jury and prosecutors were prejudiced against her husband and that a great sum of money was spent to railroad the defendant to the electric chair.
