AN HONORED RESIDENT DIES

MRS. AUSTENA SEAFELDT DEPARTS THIS LIFE AT NOON YESTERDAY—DEATH CAUSED BY PARALYSIS.

In the death of Mrs. Austena F. Seafeldt yesterday Astoria has lost an honored resident who has made this city her home since 1859. In that year she came from her home in Germany to take up her residence with her son, Albert Seafeldt, long one of Astoria's business men.

Mrs. Seafeldt's death was caused by paralysis. She was stricken by the dread disease last Thursday and did not again recover consciousness. At the time of her death deceased was nearly 82 years of age. She was born in Germany, September 25, 1825.

Mrs. Seafeldt passed away at about the noon hour. She leaves four children, two daughters and a son in Germany and Albert Seafeldt, of Astoria. The numerous friends of the family sympathize deeply with them in their great loss.
