

CIRCUS RIDER DEAD

Peculiar Death of Aged Performer in Circus Ring.

HE DIED ON HIS HORSE

Gave His Name as John Morrissey and Asked For Aid—Said He Could Ride and Was Given a Horse—Nothing is Known of Him.

NEW YORK, May 10.—An old man giving the name of John Morrissey and who said he was a former circus rider, died suddenly while giving an exhibition in a circus in this city yesterday. The man had applied to the proprietor for aid, saying:

"Let me work to earn it. I can ride for you if you'll let me. It's been my trade. My name is John Morrissey." He was sent to the cook tent and later was given a pony and told to show what he could do. To the surprise of the performers Morrissey went through feat after feat. The shabby old man became transfixed on the horse. Several times he laughed aloud as the other performers applauded his riding.

Suddenly the man flung his head into air, struggled an instant as if to retell his balance and then pitched headlong into the ring. A physician who was summoned said the man died almost instantly.

Nothing is known about the old circus rider, and his body was carried to the morgue.

CHICAGO TERMINAL PROPERTY.

Efforts to Settle Controversy Given Up—Will Be Trashed Out in Court.

CHICAGO, May 10.—The Record-Herald today says: All efforts to settle the contest for possession of the Chicago Terminal Railroad Company have been abandoned and the questions involved are to be fought out in the courts. The Baltimore & Ohio, which has bought and retired the bonds of the terminal company, is preparing a petition asking the United States court to modify its order for the sale of the property so that it will be sold subject to the least of the petitioner.

This action will be taken before Judge Kohlsatt within a few days and objection will be offered both by the majority and by the minority stockholders. The former are said to be the Morgan interests which are trying to secure the property free of the B. & O. lease, so they can fulfill a contract to turn it over to James J. Hill and the Burlington road. The minority interests are preparing a cross petition in which it will be alleged that the Baltimore & Ohio lease was procured by fraud in connection with the old lease of the St. Louis, Peoria & Northern. The Baltimore & Ohio lease was substituted for this, thereby relieving the Harriman interests from the payment of about \$150,000 annual rental to the terminal.

The minority stockholders will claim that this was an important factor in promoting the failure of the company and the court will be asked to cancel the Baltimore & Ohio lease and ask the receiver to bring suit against Harriman, George Gould and others for a large amount claimed to be due to the terminal company. The fight will be bitter and undoubtedly will keep the terminal property in a receivership several years and prevent the improvement which was proposed if the Morgan-Hill interests secured control of the terminal.

HOLDUP MAN CAPTURED.

Result of Woman's Quick Wit Robber Turned Over To Police.

CHICAGO, May 10.—One of the two robbers who held up the offices of the Great Western Smelter & Refining Company was disarmed and captured as a result of a woman's quick wit. The other escaped with the valuables, which he had taken from the men in the office.

Miss Clara Marcus, a stenographer, was responsible for the arrest of the robber, after a desperate struggle in which Charles Bloom, a member of the firm, and Samuel Shapiro participated. The prisoner gave his name as Richard Fosburg, 21 years old. The two men who were under masks, entered the office and Fosburg drew a revolver. He commanded Bloom and Shapiro to throw up their hands and his companion made a search of their pockets.

The elder of the two robbers who had secured the money slipped out of the door and Fosburg remained behind to cover his companion's retreat.

"You look like too decent a fellow to be doing this sort of thing," Miss Marcus said to him.

"Yes, why don't you go to work?" asked Mr. Bloom. "You look like a good strong fellow."

"No chance," Fosburg replied. "A fellow can't get work in this town."

"Lay that gun down and we will put you to work right here in this foundry," Shapiro put in.

Fosburg did as he was directed and Bloom grabbed the weapon, turning it quickly on its owner.

Fosburg saw that he was trapped and aimed a blow at Bloom which missed. Then he started to run. Shapiro came to the rescue and with the junior member of the firm succeeded in holding the robber until the police summoned by Miss Marcus, arrived.

Foreigners at American Smelting Works Walk Out.

SALT LAKE, May 10.—The plant of the American Smelting & Refining Company at Marray, employing over 1000 men and the monthly payroll amounting to \$75,000, closed down indefinitely tonight owing to the demand of 900 Greeks and Austrians for a flat advance of 25 cents a day. The company offered from 10 to 25 cents advance on a sliding scale. It was 25 cents or nothing with the foreigners hence the shutdown.

PACIFIC EXTENSION.

Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul To Discontinue Coast Extension.

NEW YORK, May 10.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul R.R. way yesterday the question of discontinuing work on the road's Pacific Coast extension was discussed, but after the meeting one of the officers of the road said that no decision had been reached.

President Earling's attitude in regard to postponing the work on this new line, for which 100,000,000 of new stock was issued last December, is understood to be that it would be well to postpone the work if it can be done without embarrassment and without incurring too much loss due to the shutting down of work of so great a magnitude. It will be left to the directors, however, to decide whether the work will be suspended.

The next regular meeting of the full board will be held on the last Thursday of this month, and it is probable that the question will be decided then.

CARPENTERS QUIT WORK.

Contractors Will Employ Non-Union Men—Denver To Be Open Town.

DENVER, May 10.—Seventy-five general contractors, angered at the carpenters in quitting work, because of the millmen's strike especially when they were granted a 10 per cent increase in wages April 1, yesterday announced that they would commence employing non-union laborers on next Monday. This will eventually result in Denver becoming an open town in the building trades, it is predicted.
