POLITICS IN SOUTH

Hitchcock Has Great Knowledge of Southern Republicans.

REFEREES POSTOFFICE FIGHTS

First Assistant Postmaster-General Whose Recommendations Are Followed in the Appointment of Postmasters—New Efficiency System in Operation

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Probably no official connected with the administration of President Roosevelt has a better knowledge of Republican affairs in the Southern states than Frank H. Hitchcock of Massachusetts, First Assistant Postmaster General. Hitchcock has had a somewhat remarkable career in the government service. A comparatively few years ago he graduated at Harvard, and came to Washington looking for a job.

After cruising around for awhile he finally took a position as biologist in the Department of Agriculture. By hard work and persevering energy he got promotion after promotion until he became Chief of the Section of Foreign Markets. Soon after the Department of Commerce and labor was organized, he was offered and accepted the office of chief clerk there.

But better things were in store for Hitchcock. When Mr. Cortelyou assumed the duties of the chairmanship of the Republican National Committee, Hitchcock became assistant secretary of the organization. He had about made up his mind not to re-enter the government service when he was tendered the important post of First Assistant Postmaster General.

In the reorganization of that department, the appointment of postmasters, now numbering nearly seventy thousand, was assigned to him. Mr. Cortelyou, himself a product of the so-called merit principle, made up his mind that good and efficient postmasters should be retained, and that changes in such offices should not be made just because a member of Congress wanted a change. He therefore adopted an efficiency rating. If the record of the postmaster was rated "excellent" or good, his services would be retained; if it was rated as fair, a change could be made, and if poor, the congressman could have his way about the appointment. The adoption of the rule raised a great howl and its enforcement nearly precipitated a riot. But Mr. Cortelyou won out. First Assistant Postmaster Hitchcock was the man upon whose shoulders fell the burden of the work in introducing the merit rule policy in the appointment of postmasters. He was the man who met angry senators and representatives, and pacified them; in many cases he had to tame them. But the rule came, it worked, and it is here to stay.

As the official of the Postoffice Department having to do with appointments Mr. Hitchcock was naturally brought into contact with politicians. Conditions at the North gave him little trouble after the first plunge, but in the South they were different. Hitchcock became, and is now practically the referee in all postoffice fights arising in the Southern states. His recommendations are usually followed by the Postmaster General and the President. The First Assistant has taken a deep interest in Southern political affairs. He knows everybody in the South who is anybody in politics. There is good reason to believe that despite the fact that Mr. Cortelyou wants Mr. Hitchcock to become one of his assistants at the Treasury, that the latter will remain in his present office until the close of the next campaign.

As things now size up, the two wings of the Republican party, one representing the President and his policies, and the other comprised of the "so-called Rooseveltism, will indulge in merry warfare to control the next national convention. The administration is in a fighting mood, as was made clear in the authorized stories that came from the White House concerning the "conspiracy" and five million dollar war fund that had been collected to further its aims. For that reason Mr. Hitchcock, who is intensely loyal to the President, will be a handy man in the place he now holds. The intimate acquaintance with public men in the South and his that section, make him invaluable. He can put his acquaintance with men and knowledge of conditions to better utility as first Assistant Postmaster General than he could possibly as an Assistant to Mr. Cortelyou in the Treasury Department.

WORKING WOMEN

Report of Census Bureau Based on Last Census.

OVER FIFTY PER CENT WORK

In 1900 Women Were Represented in All But Nine of the 303 Occupations of the Breadwinners of the Country—Women of All Conditions At Work.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Women at work in the United States is the subject of a report issued by the census bureau, based on the returns of 1900. In that year, exclusive of Alaska, Hawaii and other outlying possessions, the women 16 years old and over, numbered 23,485,559. Those at work numbered 14,833,630. The women at work were young, 68.4 percent being under 35 years of age, 44.2 percent under 25 and 25.6 percent under 21, 15.9 percent were married, 17.7 percent widows, and 1.3 percent were divorced. The number of divorced women returned by the census, the report says, is probably deficient because divorce is not always admitted. But it is significant that of the number supporting themselves, wholly or in part. The total number of women at work included 11,751,906 native white women whose parents also were natives, 1,087,744 native white women, one or both of whose parents were immigrants, 1,110, 021 negro women and 11,288 Indian and Mongolian women.

The number of women at work more than doubled in the 29 years from 1880 to 1900 and there was a noticeable increase of bread winners among married women in 1900 as compared with 1905.

In 1900 women were represented in all but nine of the 303 occupations of the breadwinners of the country were engaged. The returns showed among other things that four females were employed as pilots. On steam roads ten women were employed as baggagemen, 31 brakemen, seven conductors, 48 engineers and firemen and 20 switchmen, yardmen and flagmen. Forty-eight were carriage and hack drivers; six were represented as ship carpenters and two as roofers and slaters; 185 were returned as blacksmiths and 18 as machinists. Eight were boiler-makers; 31 were charcoal, coke and lime burners and 11 were well borers.

Two women were reported as being motorists. Almost a fourth of the total number at work were servants, 45 percent, 405, were farm laborers, 96.8 of whom were from the southern states, including 361,804 negroes. There were 338,144 dressmakers, 327,206 teachers, 328,395 laundresses, 307,760 farmers, 231,458 textile mill operatives and 146,921 housekeepers and stewardesses.
