WATERFRONT ITEMS

Four Schooners Clear With 2,000,000 Feet.

LURLINE DOWN AT 3:30

Alliance Came in From Coos Bay With a Heavy Passenger List—Steamer Elder Is Expected Today—The Steamer Redondo Cleared on Sunday—Notes.

Liverpool advices give an interesting account of a long-distance race participated in by the British ship Inverness-shire, Captain Tindall; the British ship Stronsa, Captain Jones, and the French ship La Perouse, Captain Corves. These vessels loaded grain on the Columbia for Europe and crossed out from Astoria on December 27, the two British ships bound direct to the Mersey and the Frenchman to the Channel, for orders. After parting from their tugs, the ships separated and never again sighted one another during their 14,000-mile voyage to England. The Inverness-shire was the first to arrive, reaching the Mersey May 2, after a passage of 126 days. La Perouse was reported off Falmouth May 4, en route for Hamburg, taking 128 days. The Stronsa reached Liverpool May 15 in 139 days. The Inverness-shire was 56 days from Astoria to Cape Horn, speaking there the Robert Duncan, which left Astoria 14 days before her, and on March 16 speaking the Empress Menelik, which left 10 days before her.

The whole of Sunday big forces of longshoremen were at work loading the Hyades and the Hyndford. The Hyndford is bound for Dalney and North China ports and takes a full cargo of flour. The Hyades will take upwards of 4000 tons of wheat to Frisco.

The steamship Columbia came down the river on Sunday evening and went to sea. She was loaded to the hatches with freight for Frisco and had 82 passengers.

The Lurline tied up at her dock at 3:30 this afternoon and got away on time. Captain Larkins was jubilant but did not give away the secret.

The German bark Tellus has finished unloading and will start putting on a cargo of fir for the west coast of South America right away.

The British ship Dalgona sailed from Hamburg January 19th and is fully due.

The steamer Telegraph had another big load of passengers today. Sunday she brought a large number of excursionists to Astoria.

The two-masted schooner Letitia cleared for Frisco yesterday with 200,000 feet of lumber loaded at Rainier.

At Westport the four-masted schooner James Rolph loaded 647,500 feet of lumber and cleared for Frisco yesterday.

The four-masted schooner William Olson loaded 675,000 feet of lumber at Tongue Point and cleared yesterday.

The schooner Muriel loaded 585,000 feet of fir at Westport and cleared for Frisco yesterday.

The Jordanhill will leave the river with lumber for South America this week.

The steam schooner Washington came in Sunday night about 10 o'clock.

The steamer Redondo cleared at 12 a. m. on Sunday.

The steamship Elder is expected in the river today.

MEETING OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS

ISSUED INSTRUCTIONS TO CHIEF OF POLICE GAMMAL TO CLOSE THE DANCE HALLS AND THINGS OF LIKE NATURE.

Last evening a meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners was held and the following resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote instructing the chief of police to strictly enforce all city ordinances relating to dance halls and other nuisances:

"Whereas, The Honorable Common Council of the City of Astoria, by resolution adopted and passed on the 23rd day of May, 1907, request that this board order the police officers of said city to strictly enforce all ordinances of the city relating to the suppression of the dance halls and nuisances.

"Now therefore, be it resolved, That the chief of police of this city is hereby directed to strictly enforce all ordinances of the City of Astoria for the suppression of dance halls and other nuisances, and to see that any persons violating said ordinances are duly prosecuted. And the clerk of this board is ordered to serve a copy of this resolution on said chief of police."

DIPHTHERIA CASE.

No Need To Fear Spread—Every Precaution Has Been Taken.

A malignant case of diphtheria is reported from 381 Twenty-eighth street, which ended fatally. Reba Heitanen, the six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Heitanen was taken ill on Saturday morning and the family physician, Dr. Toivo Forstrom, was called in. The little child died about 8 o'clock on Sunday morning and has been buried privately. It was rumored that the child had attended school during the past week. This is not the case. It had not attended school and since it was taken sick, no others of the family have attended school. There is no cause for dread of a spread of the disease, as immediately upon receipt of notice, Dr. Mohn, the city physician, took every precaution to isolate the family and the house. The house is now under strict quarantine and no one will be allowed to enter or leave it until the quarantine up and the house has been thoroughly disinfected.

Dr. Toivo Forstrom, the attending physician, has been censured by the board of health, in a letter signed by the full board, for his unaccountable delay in giving notice of the case and for not immediately securing a strict quarantine of the house and family.
