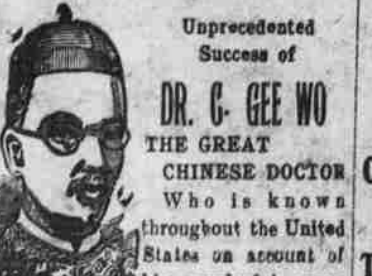

INSPECTION TOUR

Inland Waterways Commission Down the Mississippi River.

ENTERTAINED BY CITIES

Commission Has Been Nearly a Week On Trip From Kansas City To New Orleans—Guests of Citizens Along the Route Where Boat Stopped.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Like a victorious general and his staff, Congressman Theodore E. Burton and members of the Inland Waterways Commission are drawing an inspection tour of the Mississippi River to a triumphant close. The Commission, of which Mr. Burton is chairman, has spent nearly a week in proceeding down the Missouri River from Kansas City to St. Louis and thence down the Father of Waters to New Orleans. At every city and town along the big stream they have been guests of citizens, who have sought to convince the Commission of the pressing commercial necessity for the prompt and thorough development of the river.

At a rousing meeting in Memphis engineered by the business men of that city, Mr. Burton publicly announced his hearty sympathy with the ambitions of the people of the Mississippi Valley. He said: "I am in favor of the fourteen-foot channel through the Mississippi, yet public sentiment must be aroused if you would ever attain it."

This express by Mr. Burton aroused the greatest enthusiasm. There long has been a mistaken notion that the chairman of the Rivers and Harbors Committee of the House has been bitterly opposed to the plan of a ship canal connecting the Great Lakes with the Gulf. Under this misapprehension, the State legislatures of Illinois, Missouri and North Dakota adopted resolutions condemning his supposed attitude.

As a matter of fact, Mr. Burton has been friendly to the scheme, but as chairman of a powerful committee, he declined to commit himself to any plan of improvement before the most complete and minute preparations had been made. This determination on his part brought down upon him a storm of undesired criticism in the last session, although his committee included in the rivers and harbors bill a sum sufficient for a complete survey and examination of the proposed canal route, later for the prosecution or the work about it be found feasible.

The Inland Waterways Commission had as its cicerone on its voyage down the Mississippi, Congressman Joseph E. Ransdell of Louisiana, who besides being a member of Chairman Burton's committee in the House, is also president of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, an organization that is seeking to convince Congress that an appropriation of \$50,000,000 annually is not too great to expend on improvements to streams and ports. All the down the river, at every harbor into which the Steamer Mississippi poked its nose, a score of telegrams were picked up, urging the commission to stop off and be the guest of town farther down the stream.

Greenville, Vicksburg, Arkansas City, Natchez and a score of other towns and cities entertained the visitors and sought to convince them that the people of the Mississippi valley are a unit in believing that adequate sums should be expended by the federal government in improving the big stream.

In the party chaperoned by Congressman Ransdell is Chairman Burton, Senator Newlands, W. J. McGee, Congressman Bankhead, General MacKenzie, F. H. Newell, Chief Forester Pinchot, and Commissioner of Corporations Herbert Knox Smith. In addition, Lieutenant-Colonel Sears and Lieutenant-Colonel Townsend of the Army are making the trip. These latter are members of the board of engineers and have in the past made considerable investigation of the possibilities of the stream and of the best means of harnessing it, and ending the disastrous floods that

sweep the low-lying lands near the delta.

The members of the Commission were advised by telegraph of the provisional acceptance by the President of the invitation of the governors of sixteen states urging him to make the trip in the Fall. The fact that Mr. Roosevelt, in his letter to the chief executives of the different states joining in the invitation, voiced his hearty sympathy with the ambitions of the people of the Mississippi Valley, undoubtedly will carry much weight with the forthcoming Congress. The fact that the development of the Mississippi River is nation-wide in its importance is evidence by the fact that the governor of Maine is one of the petitioners.

HEADS AND HORNS.

Big Game Heads Being Gathered For Zoological Exhibit.

NEW YORK, May 27.—With a nucleus of 132 big game heads and horns representing 109 different species, the "National Collection of Heads and Horns" has been started in the New York Zoological park. Realizing the threatened danger of the extinction of the great game animals of America, and in practically all the rest of the globe, the promoters of the scheme believe the time is ripe for the gathering together of the records and tokens of hundreds of disappearing species. Two series of exhibits are planned, the first zoological and the second geographical. Under the first head, specimens will be arranged to show evolution and relationship. The nucleus collection contains a series showing the progress from the yearling buffalo bull to the twenty year old "stub horn" bull, collected on the Montana range. It is probably impossible to duplicate this series from wild resources. In the geographical series will be shown the centers of distribution and the culminating points of many species popular with American sportsmen and naturalists. Here will naturally be gathered together such a collection of maps and photographs of living wild animals both in their haunts and in captivity, as has never yet been formed. The records of big game which naturally will accumulate in the national collection will soon represent great zoological value. Nearly all of the specimens which form the nucleus were presented by Dr. William T. Hornaday, director of the New York Zoological Park. Beside Dr. Hornaday, who represents the Camp Fire Club in the movement, the other immediate promoters of the enterprise are Madison Grant, for the Boone and Crockett Club and John W. Phillips, Pennsylvania State Zoological Society will undertake the maintenance of the collection and it is hoped that ultimately a special building will be provided in which to house it.
